


Here's Your Decision

If with first base occupied and less than two out, the batsman is automatically out on three strikes, regardless of whether or not the catcher holds the ball. It matters not if the ball is so wildly pitched that it goes to the stands; if it is the third strike the batsman is automatically retired. This rule was made to prevent the catcher purposely dropping a third strike with a man on first and less than two out, thereby hoping to complete a double play. It was made to protect the base-runner, and the automatic retiring of the batter gives him that protection, as he is not forced to advance on the play.
