APPROVE ACTION OF GOVERNMENT

Witnesses Declare Fire Rangers Not Needed in Organized Townships.

NEW LISKEARD, Nov. 2.—Approval of the provincial government's action in withdrawing fire rangers from the organized township of this district was expressed by a number of witnesses, including Reeve Hooper of Hudson, testifying here at the inquiry being conducted by the fire marshal into the recent disaster in Temiskaming. Incidentally, it was disclosed by E. Sackrider, clerk of the same municipality, that the suggestion to remove the rangers came from the U. E. O. county board of Charlton, the idea being embodied in a resolution passed at a meeting of that body held here in September of last year.

Reeve Hooper declared he spoke in a dual capacity, both by virtue of his office and as a farmer in the district. He claimed that the municipalities, being organized, were capable of handling the situation themselves, and it was pointed out that the original proposal provided for the appointment in each township of an officer whose duties would be similar to those formerly undertaken by the rangers. U. S. POLITICIAN RIDICULES KLAN

Senator James Reed Calls Ku Klux Klan Serpent of Dark Ages.

New York, Nov. 2.—Prohibition and the Ku Klux Klan, the women's votes and the excess profits tax, the tariff and the "living wage," are among a host of subjects of which voters all over the United States were exhorted last night.

With the election campaign fast coming to an end, John T. Adams, chairman of the Republican national committee, buoyantly announced last night in Washington that the Democrats were "whistling in the dark to keep up their courage," replying to statements, which he said, the Democrats had circulated, declaring that there was a drift away from the Republican candidates. "A Republican victory that will be a real victory is certain next Tuesday," he said.

Mrs. Emily Newell Blaine, vice-chairman of the Democratic national convention, predicted that the women next Tuesday would vote far more intelligently than they had done hitherto. She said that women had by this time accumulated themselves to the idea of using the franchise, and had had time to chart a course and select party alignments.

In Kansas City, Senator James Reed, Democratic candidate, ridiculed the Ku Klux Klan.

"After fifteen years of national life," Senator Reed asserted, "the serpent of proscription has crawled down from the dark ages, wound itself around the temple of liberty, and thrust its tongue against the goddess of liberty."

"I wonder if its members have read the constitution?" Reed asked in his attack on the Klan. "They evidently have not, for they foster racial and religious prejudice."

SENTEENCES FIEND TO FORTY YEARS

Confessed Abductor of 12-Year-Old Muskegon Girl Taken To Prison.

MUSKEGON, Nov. 2.—Twenty-four hours after his arrest in Grand Rapids, Ray Eugene Wilson, confessed abductor of pretty 12-year-old Rosalie Shanty, was sentenced to serve from 34 to 40 years in state prison at Marquette by Judge Vandewert in circuit court this afternoon. The court recommended 40 years.

Judge Vandewert was tense with emotion as he spoke briefly of the crime.

"This is one of the most heinous offenses I have ever heard of," he said. "The sanctity of law has been violated. I do not trust myself to speak at length. This man is a terrible menace to the country at large, and especially to its women and children. When I consider the mental and bodily anguish endured by this girl, and that of her relatives, it is necessary for me to hold myself in check."

Approves Crowd.
Applause resounded in the courtroom before the judge had finished. He leaped to his feet and reproved the crowd. The man who started the applause was ordered out of the courtroom.

Wilson, nervous and apprehensive of some demonstration from the excited populace, entered the courtroom without an attorney. In a few words he entered his plea. He assured the judge he knew the seriousness of the crime and intimidated by his demeanor that he wanted to get away, anywhere, even to prison for life. There had been vague mutterings of summary justice among the spectators.

While court hearings were brought on the parents of the little girl were preparing to catch a train for Dublin, Mich., where Rosalie, half nude, bruised and her mind deranged, was found. They expect to bring her back tomorrow. The judge has assured her will live, but physicians say she can never be the same. Wilson was arrested in Kalamazoo three years ago charged with attacking a 13-year-old school girl. Pleading guilt, he was sentenced to serve 18 months to 10 years in Jackson prison.

Admitted Offense.
After serving a year more than the minimum he was paroled August 13, 1921. Records show he went from Jackson to Arkdale, Wis., with his wife. There, under an agreement with state parole board, he made one report on his arrival in Wisconsin and was discharged from parole.

While being brought here from Grand Rapids, Wilson, the prosecutor said, admitted luring the girl away from Muskegon in an automobile as she left the Bible class Sunday. Grilled on his arrival here, he admitted he attacked the child. At 7 o'clock tonight Wilson, heavily guarded, was started for Marquette. Officers had to literally fight their way through the crowd with the prisoner, in much the same way as in a football scrimmage.

WOODSTOCK, Nov. 2.—The Alumnae Association of the Woodstock General Hospital held a bazaar on Wednesday afternoon and night, the funds to be used to swell the funds of the Nurses' War Memorial. The affair was a complete success and over \$600 was raised.

BOSANQUET RESIDENT PASSES IN 89TH YEAR

George Lockrey, Veteran of Fenian Raid, Expires After Extended Illness.

THEDFORD, Nov. 1.—The funeral of the late George Lockrey, who died Saturday, was held Monday from the residence of his son-in-law, Capt. W. Bryant, Thedford, to Beechwood Cemetery, Forest.

Mr. Lockrey was born near Whitby and was in his 89th year. When he was 14 years old he came with his parents to Nissouri Township. Sixty years ago his parents came to Bosanquet and settled on the 8th concession. In 1868 Mr. Lockrey married Mrs. Martin of St. Marys, and after the death of his wife in 1875 he moved to Bosanquet with

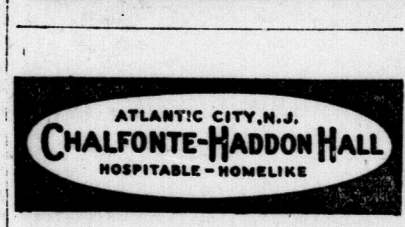
his three small children. For the past 22 years he had made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Bryant.

He served in the Fenian Raid of 1870 with the Lakeside Company of the 22nd Oxford Rifles, under Capt. James Monroe of Woodstock. For this service he received a medal and land grant of 160 acres in New Ontario. Mr. Lockrey had been in failing health for several years, and for the past four months had been confined to his bed.

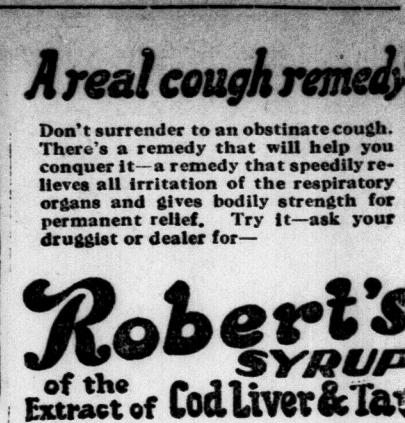

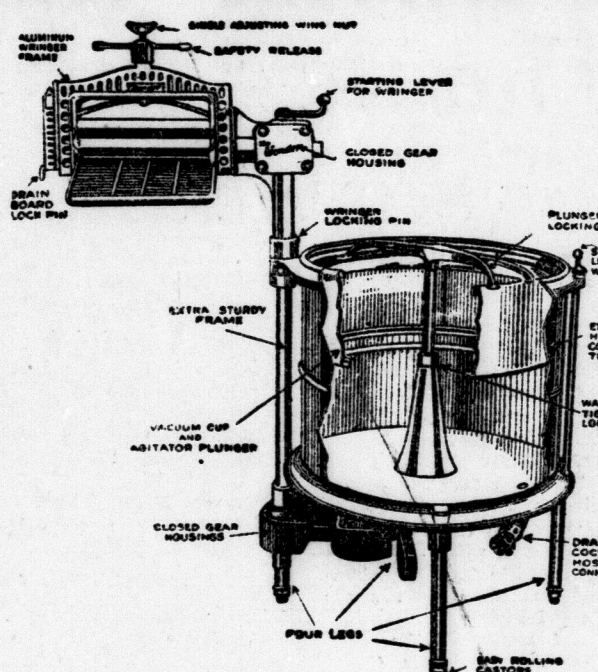
