SENTENCES FIEND TO FORTY YEARS

Confessed Abductor of 12-Year-Old Muskegon Girl Taken To Prison.

Special to The Advertiser. MUSKEGON, Nov. 2.-Twentyfour hours after his arrest in Grand Rapids, Ray Eugene Wilson, con-

fessed abductor of pretty 12-year-old Rosalie Shanty, was sentenced to serve from 34 to 40 years in state prison at Marquette by Judge Vanderwert in circuit court this after-The court recommended 40 years.
Judge Vanderwert was tense with emotion as he spoke briefly of the

crime.
"This is one of the most heinous

offenses I have ever heard of," he said. "The sanctity of law has been violated. I do not trust myself to speak at length. This man is a terrible menace to the country at large, and especially to its women and children. When I consider the mental dren. Admitted Offense.

After serving a year more than the inimum he was paroled August 13, 1921. Records show he went from Jackson to Arkdale, Wis., with his wife. There, under an agreement with state parole board, he made one report on his arrival in Wisconsin and was discharged from parole.

While being brought here from Grand Rapids, Wilson, the prosecutor said, admitted luring the girl away from Muskegon in an automobile as she left the Bible class Sunday. Grilled on his arrival here, he admitted he attacked the child. At 7 o'clock tonight Wilson, heavily guarded, was started for Marquette. Officers had to literally fight their way through the crowd with the prisoner, in much the same way as in a football scrimmage.

CARGO OF RUM WORTH \$20,000 SEIZED AT SYDNEY

SYDNEY, N.S., Nov. 2. - Liquor valued at \$20,000 was seized by the revenue cutter Sagamore last night when the schooner Edna H. was taken into custody as a suspected

rum-unner.

This is said to be the largest seizure of the kind in this vicinity.

The Sagamore late last night came upon the suspected schooner off Low Point when the latter was thought to be attempting to lead her week. to be attempting to land her cargo, which consisted of 269 cases of whiskey and 31 kegs of rum.

It is believed the liquor was purchased at St. Pierre and was intended for Glace Bay and New Waterford ports.


