**LITTLE GIRL SHOT
WHEN GUN GOES

It is understood that the children were arguing over who should have the gun first when it discharged. The bullet entered the little girl's abdomen, causing a gaping wound. She died about 25 minutes later.

**HAMILTON HYDRO BOARD

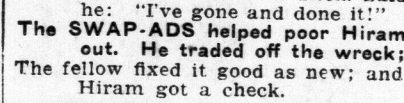
New York, June 20.—Definite steps to close the doors of many stock brokerage houses, against which complaints have been received, will be taken in the supreme court tomorrow, it was announced tonight by Attorney General John Dwyer. Injunctions against various brokers will be asked, he said.

Mr. Dwyer said he would act under the Martin Act, passed recently by the state legislature, which authorized the attorney-general to investigate brokers and suspend them by injunction in case fraudulent practices were disclosed. The deputy attorney-general has been conducting his investigation quietly since the passage of the bill, he said.
