London Liberals Prepare For Provincial Campaign

Organization of Party in City Is Taken Up At Hyman Hall Meeting—Optimism Prevails In Ranks of Local Reformers.

Organization of the Liberal party in London preparatory to the coming provincial election commenced in earnest at Hyman Hall last night when ward one was thoroughly gone over and officials placed to bring that section of the city to a state of political readiness.

A Tabbot occupied the chair and stressed the necessity for perfecting the Liberal organization. That was the first essential, he said. A convention would of course be held later and a candidate chosen in the most democratic fashion, but until that date arrives each ward should be completely organized for the oncoming battle.

The object of the series of meetings which will be held twice and three times a week is to organize the London Liberalism until the campaign terminates in the appointment of committees for each of the 78 odd sub-divisions. The first meeting of last night for each sub-division of ward one and these will in turn organize a committee which will elect its chairman.

Your Backyard Garden

Not Too Late Yet To Start Tomato, Cabbage or Cauliflower Plants Indoors.

Amateur gardeners who take a keen interest in all of their gardening operations usually like to grow their own tomato, cabbage and cauliflower plants. The season is far gone for the starting of commercial hot-houses, but for the backyard gardener who is not content with the market there is still time if the matter is taken in hand at once.

If you do not care to go to the trouble of making a hot-house, it is quite possible to raise a flat or two of very nice tomato plants by starting them in a sunny window, preferably one with a south exposure. There are many varieties of tomato, several of which are well adapted to backyard gardening, among the best being Chalk's Jewel, John Baer, Industry and Bonny Bell.

To make a nursery flat for window growing, first get a clean flannel hadie box and bore several holes for drainage in the bottom of the box, or flat, as they are known among gardeners. Fill the box with a mixture of rich soil, black muck and sand, with the earth and muck in equal parts, and one-third of the whole sand. The sand is added to keep the mixture from packing from continued watering. Sow the tomato seed in very shallow drills made with a match or the point of a pencil, and cover with just enough soil to make sure that the seed will not be exposed by watering. Press the soil down firmly on the seed and place the flat in the window. Watering frequently to keep the soil moist is all the attention that is required until the plants are two inches high, at which time they must be transplanted into other flats, allowing each plant four square inches at least.

When transplanted these second flats should be kept in a cooler location in order to prevent the plants from becoming overgrown. They are preparatory to planting out of doors. Cabbage and cauliflower plants may be started in the same way, although among gardeners, this is usually delayed till the plants can be started out of doors in a cold-frame or in the open.

To build a frame, first dig a pit slightly wider all around than the intended size of the frame, and have this at least three feet deep. Nothing short of three feet will do—in fact, the work must be done thoroughly to be sure that a depth of three feet will be sufficient. Next make your frame with your boards, taking care to have the corners securely nailed in order to keep in the heat. The sides should be at least one foot in height, and if it is desired to slope the frame six inches to the front side, the back board will have to be eighteen inches in height. This slope is used to insure the sash shedding rain rapidly, since if it does not, it is likely to leak and chill off the frame by too much moisture.

The next step is to put in three feet of fresh, strawy stable manure. This should be moistened and tramped down firmly and evenly until there is room for eight inches of soil. To the soil slightly above ground level. Use the same soil mixture as recommended for filling flats.

Place the frame in position and cover it with the sash, and in a few days the temperature will rise to well over 100 degrees. Test this from time to time with a thermometer, and when the temperature falls below 80 degrees it will be safe to plant your seed.

The care of the frame will consist in a daily watering and the ventilation of the frame. At no time except during heavy, cold rains or a late snowfall, should your frame be entirely closed.

ARRANGE CROP CONTESTS

Ingersoll, April 13.—On behalf of the Ingersoll, North and West Oxford Agricultural Society a campaign will soon be opened in connection with the standing field crop competition.

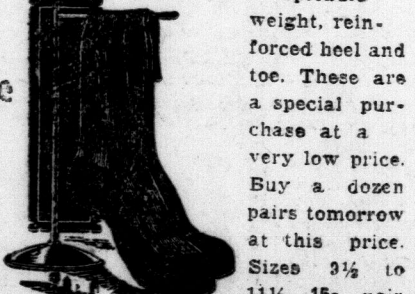

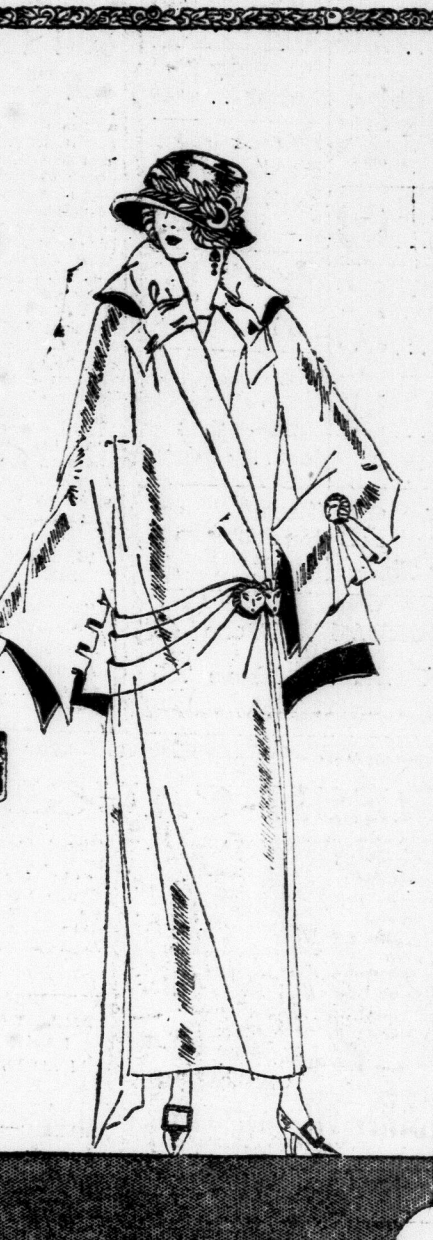
