JAPAN THREE CENTURIES AGO. Peculiar Conditions Noted by English Sea Captain on First Visit.

Entertaining pictures of Japan and the Japanese, as they were seen by an English sea captain three hundred years ago, are to be found in the old log book of a Dutch trader.

As to their naval enterprise, Saris says: "About eight or ten leagues on this side the straits of Xelima-Sagua we found a large Towne where there lay in a Dock a Juncke of eight hundred or a thousand tonnes of burthen, sheathed all of yron, with a guard appointed to keep her from firing and reloading."

Saris coasted round to Fushimi, where he saw the garrison three thousand strong. He killed a Chinese that was sent to meet him.

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
