petroleum to make one barrel of refined
burning fluid, and there is left nearly two The carbon of the tar is utilized by Hall to increase the oil by adding water in the following manner: One barrel of orude oil and two barrels of water are put into a still or retort. A powerful current of electricity is then applied, which decomposes the water into its component gasses of hydrogen and oxygen. The oxygen unites with the sulphur, forming sulphuric acid, and decdorizes the oil, while the hydrogen unites with the carbon of the tar, forming the hydro-carbon oil, and this increases the single barrel of crude
