

HALLAM A THIRD TERM MAN.

UNIVERSITY SENATE.
The Platform of One of the High School Candidates.

To the Headmasters and Assistants of High Schools and Collegiate Institutes in Ontario.

GENERAL.—In agreeing to offer myself as a candidate for the High School Masters' representative on the Senate of the University of Toronto I shall state briefly my views on the University question that made

the election of Dr. Clark.

I maintain that the High Schools are unrepresented in the Senate.

I think it is desirable that the eastern section of the Province should be represented on the Senate.

I favor a uniform matriculation examination—the best attainable.

I am active to have desirable changes in the University curriculum—especially in English and Classics—as suggested by the High School masters.

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
