My own opinion has long been that the political union of Canada and the United States is the only way to secure the removal of the tariff wall between us. Such a union would do away with all difficulties as to loss of revenue attendant upon either free trade with Great Britain or unrestricted reciprocity with the United States. Our public debt also would be as sumed by the United States, so that we should not require to resort to taxation to meet even it.


