QUYBEC, Sept. 18.—Parliament Square was ealivened this morning with thousands of spectators who congregated there to witness the pageant which attends the installation of a Governor-General.

In the Legislative Assembly Hall Sir Montgomery Moore occupied the throne of honor, for he was still the administrator of the Dominion. On his left his aides-decamp were standing.

London, Sept. 18.—The subject of Crofter colonization in Canada came up in the House of Commons on Saturday. Sir George Otto Trevelyan, replying to General Loder, said that the fourth report of the Colonization Board was nearly ready, but owing to the absence of some members of the board whose signatures were necessary he would be unable to lay it on the table until November. The Government did not intend to ask a further vote of money, as the former vote was not yet exhausted. Members before pressing the Government for more money for state colonization would do well to read the report.

The Crofters Are Poor Pay,

The Crofters Are Poor Pay. Sir George expressed the Government's extreme dissatisfaction at the result of the experiment with the Saltcoats and Killarney settlers in the Canadian Northwest. The Crofters had not paid back any instalments of the money advanced them and had not even paid their municipal taxes. The immigrants were not of that class, however, in the Highlands, for whom Parliament had voted £20,000.

BANKS IN A QUANDARY,

New York, Sept. 18.—The National banks of this city are receiving so much money at present from country banks that they are in a quandary as to its disposition. One result of this condition is the movement of some of the National banks to retire the extra circulation they took out during the stringency. The Fourth National Bank of this city has withdrawn \$500,000 of Government bonds deposited to secure circulation, surrendering the equivalent in its own notes, Several other banks contemplate the same action. So much gold coin has come into active circulation since the money stringency set in that a greater part of the daily settlements of clearing house balances is in gold.
