

A New Brunswick Judgeship Filled - The Petition of the Manitoba Hierarchy on the School Question.

Ottawa, Jan. 22.-There was no meeting of Council to-day, and consequently there is nothing to do at the meeting of Parliament, but an impression is getting abroad that it will be called for latter part of next month, probably about the 21st.

There will be an election before a session, and the idea is gaining ground that Mr Mackenzie Bowell will meet Parliament first and afterwards appeal to the country.

Rev. Father Allard, who was the bearer of the new petition from the hierarchy of Manitoba on the school question for the past few days, and had an interview with the Premier, when it was suggested that he presented the petition, but the Premier was engaged with his family party to-night and could not be seen.

AN INCREASED SUBSIDY.

Manitoba Gains \$300,000 a Year by the Re-adjustment.

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 22.-Attorney-General Sifton and Treasurer McMillan have been asking for an increase of the Provincial subsidy, on the basis of 200,000 acres of land.

The last census gives the province about 152,000. The increase per capita is about \$40,000 annually. The Provincial Ministers got an official reply from Mr. Foster, stating that the Government will not agree to pay an increase on the subsidy on the basis of 200,000 acres of land.

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SHOT DOWN IN BROOKLYN STREETS

The Military Open Fire on the Rioters - One Man Killed - No Prospect of a Settlement.

Jan. 22.-Mobs of violence continued in the presence of troops in Brooklyn to-day. Troops fired upon the mob to-night. The 7000 men of the First and Second Brigades had not restored order, and the Third Brigade had been notified and is in readiness to proceed to the scene of the strife short notice.

The car companies made some progress toward resuming traffic. More cars were run on the lines which have been opened for two or three days, and two new lines were opened. In one case troops and police lined the route for blocks and shot at people in windows who threw missiles, and the other troops, A. charged with the duty of keeping the cars in the hands of the mob. Both these affairs will be reported to the court in broad daylight.

Light disturbances were reported from various parts of the city. There were only a dozen arrests in all. A fatal had connection with the disturbances. Strikers captured men hired by the rioters to keep the streets in order. The Mayor has issued an additional proclamation as follows:

"I, the Mayor, do hereby proclaim that in this community, must be respected by all and must be enforced upon all alike. If it is not, a riot will be the result. The situation grows more serious during the day. To-night the outbreak is most serious. The breach between the striking employees of the trolleys and the company has been widened by the day's work."

Master Workman Martin J. Connelly in the afternoon, and a marked feature of the rioting was a peaceful assemblage of workmen, seized their papers and walked to the scene of the riot.

The militia admit throwing out a column of soldiers for two blocks from the Broadway Hotel, in his face they threw two hours, while the cars were operated by the rioters. They were not being bled and papers.

Fifteen flames who were on strike of the rioters were on the day were ordered back to work by Connelly, but when he heard of the rioters on the Broadway line. One shot was fired by a Seventh Regiment man before it was a riot.

The first car had its windows smashed while others were hit with stones and bricks. At 5:50 the rioters, William McCann of the Sixth Precinct, while on his way to work, was shot in the back by a woman. At 8:30 p.m. a squad of police dispersed a crowd and fired several shots at the rioters.
