RESULT OF PEACE PARLEY

Conference of All Nations Is Only Solution.

In inner diplomatic circles at the Washington conference on the limitation of disarmament there is a prevailing sentiment that President Harding's suggestion of an association of nations, with representation from both Germany and Russia, will be adopted. This the optimistic message brought to London by Col. C. H. Reason, who was a few days ago summoned to take part in the parley at the American capital. The delegates themselves, whose views are censored before they reach the press, are favorably impressed with the scheme, which, if followed out, would mean that Germany would be able to send representatives to the present conference and would also be a unit in future gatherings of the pro-posed Associated of Nations.

There is a party in the Senate who are inclined to shy at the proposal, but even they are not tremendously active in opposing the scheme," said the colonel. "The American people are more or less divided on the question, but the majority, I believe, do not want \$326 00 the conferences to exclude certain countries. The belief is that only by a world-wide conference will the solution of the world difficulties be made. The League of Nations would not necessarily be scrapped, but would be merely extended to embrace Germany, Russia and other countries."

Col Reason was asked if the conference did not begin with great eclat with President Harding's initial announcement and then apparently ebb in importance. He pointed out that the reason for this admitted condition was that the conference consisted of a series of ommittee meetings for the most part and that only once in a few days would
