Arson.—The Supreme Court was occupied  
on Saturday last from ten o'clock in the  
morning until after nine o'clock at night, in  
investigating a charge of fire raising, brought  
against Julia Ann Hartt, and James O'Hara.  
J. A. Street, Esq. conducted the prosecution  
on behalf of the Crown; L. A. Wilmet, Esq.,  
appeared by direction of the presiding Judge  
for the female prisoner, and D. S. Kerr, Esq.,  
defended O'Hara.

The prisoners were indicted for the capital  
offence of setting fire to a dwelling house in  
which persons were living. After a patient  
and laborious investigation, His Honor Judge  
Street summed up the evidence adduced, in  
an able and most impressive charge—direct-  
ing the Jury to give the accused the benefit  
of any doubt which might rest on their minds,  
with respect to the prisoners being the par-  
ties who set fire to the building. The Jury,  
after retiring for about ten minutes, returned  
into Court with a verdict of Not Guilty.

DEATH OF DOCTOR VONDY.—We last week  
announced the illness of Dr. Vondy, the  
Health Officer at the Lazaretto; and it is our  
painful duty this day to record his death.—  
He fell a sacrifice to that alarming disease  
with which the ill-fated ship Looshtauk was  
visited, and expired on Friday morning last,  
about 8 o'clock. His remains were placed in  
a doubled coffin, made perfectly airtight, and  
conveyed from Middle Island to Coulson's  
ship, and from thence to St. Paul's Churchyard,  
followed by an immense concourse of peo-  
ple.

We have seldom witnessed an occurrence  
that cast so deep a gloom over the commu-  
nity. As soon as his death was announced, all  
the shops were closed, and business partially  
suspended throughout the day. The sum of  
£60 was subscribed in the churchyard, for  
the purpose of erecting a suitable testimonial  
to commemorate the sad event, and justify  
the respect felt for the memory of the de-  
ceased. Dr. Vondy was in the 27 year of his  
age.—Gleaner July 6
