NINETEEN DIE IN TRAIN ACCIDENTS IN DECEMBER

Ottawa, Jan. 11—The return of accidents on Canadian railways during the month of December last has just been issued by the Board of Railway Commissioners as follows: Passengers killed, 1; injured, 7; employees killed, 10; injured, 100; others killed, 8; injured, 26. Total killed, 19; injured, 132.

The number of persons killed at highway crossings accidents was 6; injured, 18. Of the six killed five were at unprotected crossings.
