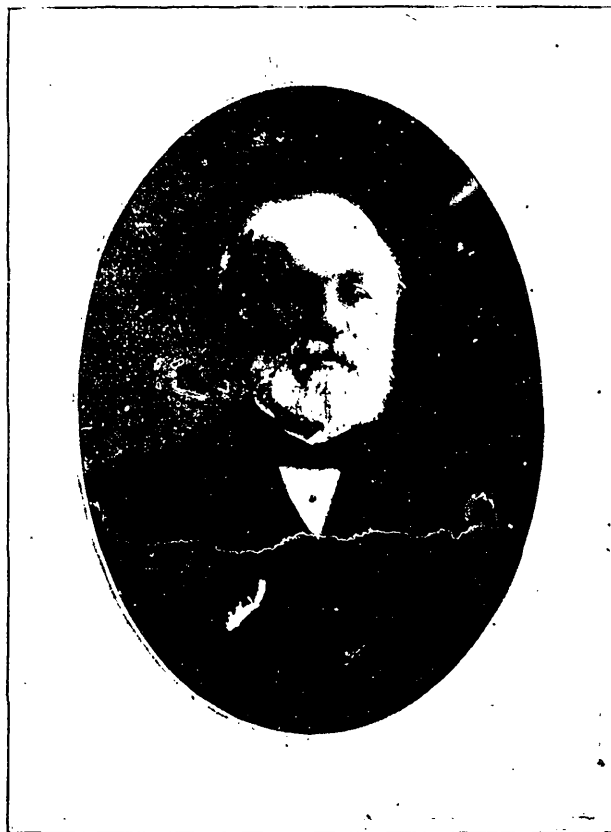




BRO. ROBERT JAFFRAY, THE FIRST CANDIDATE.
