A Manitoba Fire.

On March 16 a fire occurred in a store occupied by Morrow Bros. at Portage la Prairie and it was decided to hold an inquiry before Mr. W. E. Macara as fire commissioner. Mr. Phippen attended on behalf of the board of underwriters.

On the night in question, as was shown by the evidence taken, a voisume of smoke was seen to issue from the McLenaghan block, in which Morrow Bros, store was situated; the upper stories were occupied as apartments by private persons and considerable excliment existed among them while trying to remove their property. Chief Roxborough's evidence showed that on his arriving at the McLenaghan block he discovered fire in the cellar of Morrow's store and also in the back part of the store; both fires were put out and the damage was confined to the store. The following day the chief examined the premises and found that the fire in the store was not over the place of that in the cellar. The caretaker of the block gave evi-

dence that the block was heated by steam, that the furnace was not in Morrow's cellar, and there was a stone wall between their cellar and the furnace room.

Mr. J. A. Carley was sent to Portage la prairie to appraise the loss. He stated the fixtures and the stock in hand on the day of the fire were worth about \$1,945. According to Morrow Bros.' books they should have had stock to the value of \$0,520.80, there being thus a difference of \$1,722 between the stock in the store and the amount which should have been there as shown by the books. These figures were approved by the appraisers acting for Morrow Bros, and they also signed the statement verifying the correctness of them. The insurance carried by Morrow Bros, amounted to \$0,400.

Both the Morrow Bros, were examined, but both stated they could not account for the cause of the fire unless it had been started by an incendiary. They also stated that they left the store shortly after 10 o'clock, everything had then been locked up and appeared to be secure. There was no story used on the arenises. They and appeared to be secure. There was no stove used on the premises. They knew that the insurance was in excess of stock on hand, and should only have been for two-thirds of the value of what was there, but as they intended to get in some more goods they did not think it worth while to reduce the amount of the insurance.

The inquiry was adjourned as Mr. Morrow, senior, had left town before a subpoena could be served upon him. Morrow Bros. have not put in any claim for the loss incurred by the fire and Mr. Phippen advised them not to do so.

Farm Machine Trusts.

Farm Machine Trusts.

New York, April 25.—The Journal of Commerce says of the proposed combination of plow manufacturers reported from Chicago.

"It is learned in this city that the present plans, instead of being merely for a consolidation of the plow industry, contemplate a consolidation which shall include every branch of the firm machinery trade with the exception of mowers and reapers. The reported capital of \$50,000,000 is said to be a minimum figure." Concerns in Utica, Syracuse and Buffalo, N. Y., and York, Pa., are said to be among those which favor the present plans. It is intended to secure all concerns rated at \$100,000 or more.

"The financial details have not yet been arranged, but it is understood that the capital of the new company, if formed, will be divided equally between preferred and common stocks. The good will is to go in at about one-third the total capitalization. It is stated that the tangible value of the plants it is intended to consolidate is upwards of \$35,000,000.

Syracuse, N. Y., April 25.—Col. Jas. Manning, of the Syracuse Chilled Plow company, returned on Tuesday from attending the conference at Chicago. According to the information secured from Col. Manning, the Syracuse company is the only one in the east interested in the new combination, some of the others being the Deer Plow company, of Moline, Illinois, and the McCormick Harvester company, and companies located in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, and Wisconsin.
