COUGH IN PHTHISIS.—Daly recommends for the hard, dry cough of phthisis the following combination:

To be made into a pill with a proper vehicle. The camphor does away in large part with the general depression.—N. Y. Med. Journal.

ECLAMPSIA—Dr. Price says that the green root tinct, gelsemium, in doses of from 20 to 30 drops had succeeded as well as morphine hypodermically in eclampsia.

PALATABLE EFFERVESCENT QUININE.—The Journal of Tropical Medicine quotes the following from the Therapist:

Ten or twenty drops to be added to two ounces of water containing five or six grains of sodium bicarbonate. Ten drops of the mixture contains about one grain of quinine.—N. Y. Med. Journal.

Vomiting or Pregnancy.—Monin has been struck by the resemblance which the symptoms presented by certain pregnant women bear to those of hypersecretion. Gastric pain, heartburn, acidity, nausea, and vomiting, occurring especially in the morning and relieved by taking food, are all symptoms commonly observed both in hypersecretion and pregnancy. As a consequence of the suggestiveness of this observation, satisfactory results have been obtained in the case of pregnant women by administering daily five doses of sodium bicarbonate, each consisting of thirty grains given in a capsule.—Lyon Medical.

FOUL SMELLING CANCERS.—If iodoform gauze be saturated with a solution of the compound tincture of benzoin and applied in eases of foul smelling cancers and open malignant ulcers, the odor will be completely destroyed. The offensive and persistent odor in these cases renders life a burden both to the patient and attendants.—Chicago Medical Times.
