Excellency,

I have the honour to present you with the second volume of the Canadian Anti-Apartheid Register.

The Register contains a list of Canadian individuals, companies and organizations who have spoken out or taken action to demonstrate their opposition to the abhorrent system of apartheid in South Africa.

Canada, as you know, continues to be in the forefront of concerted international efforts to promote the creation of a united, non-racial and democratic South Africa. The Government of Canada believes that international economic and political pressures must be maintained on South Africa until the complete dismantling of apartheid. At the same time, efforts should continue to favour national reconciliation in that troubled country. During the past year, both the Prime Minister of Canada, the Right Honourable Brian Mulroney, and I have travelled to Africa to further these objectives.

My government is convinced that the actions taken by individuals, companies and non-governmental organizations will play a vital role in bringing fundamental change to South Africa. The second volume of the Canadian Anti-Apartheid Register represents the efforts and continuing commitment of thousands more Canadians in this regard.
