is laid before us. I think it is our responsibility to have in our hands, even if some members do not want to read it, the evidence in connection with this case and with the other cases before we go ahead with them.

I dislike voting on these divorce cases one way or the other. As some hon, members are suggesting, once these people have paid their fees and have gone through the routine that is required, they have a certain right. But I submit that they also have the right to have this sort of matter dealt with somewhere else than in parliament. I feel that we have got to face up to that fact just as soon as possible. For the moment, however, that question is not before us, Mr. Speaker. You have ruled that we must deal with the bill that is in our hands. What we have now before us is Bill No. 12, an act for the relief of a certain person. I submit that, with no evidence and no information about this case other than the name of the petitioner and the name of the person against whom the charge of adultery is made, we should wait until we have the evidence. Believing that it is the responsible thing for a member of this house to do in this circumstance, Mr. Speaker, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Melfort (Mr. Wright), that the debate on the motion for second reading of Bill No. 12 be now adjourned.

Mr. Speaker: Is it the pleasure of the house to adopt the motion?
