Canada. This way he would learn that all that is physically desirable must be made financially possible and that with a financial system attuned to reality financial problems would no longer exist when there is no production problem.

As Marquis Serra wrote in his book entitled "Le Chaos économique et la Révolution qui vient", and I quote,

Counting in terms of units called dollars the development of materials, natural resources and technology is an art in infancy. And so it is also when we create purely monetary means—credit, that is—to facilitate the exchange of various services which will carry out the plans.

I think that in this day and age it would be proper for all concerned to seriously look for a way out of this ludicrous social structure which allows a close mixture of poverty and wealth. Money does not grow on trees, as someone said earlier, and the creditistes have known that for a long time. It does not come out of thin air. It is created by man, made scarce by man and, unfortunately, the government which claims sovereignty lets itself be led and controlled by those who manipulate the money and the country and who hold the economic life in their hands to the extent that without their consent no one can breathe.

I think the creditistes are right in offering the solution they advocate and the population who is beginning to understand what is going on is prepared to change this system that breeds too much misery.

Mr. Henry Latulippe (Compton): Mr. Speaker, it is a pleasure for me to comment on the motion proposed by the hon, member for Champlain (Mr. Matte).

There is obviously some depth to this motion, and this does not please all hon. members. Those who are working in this House in order to get re-elected certainly do not like it. This motion does not suit them at all.

Mr. Speaker, in view of the hard times we are going through nowadays, I would say that there is too little understanding, too much disagreement, too little dialogue, too much parading, too little comprehension. At a time when we should be understanding one another in this House, at a time when we should be sharing an educative system in order to rebalance our economy, we just turn our backs and make fun of those people who really have in-depth reforms to suggest in order to rebalance our economy, which is completely unbalanced.

This does not mean that government supporters or administrators are all to blame. I have said this before and I am saying it again: Several of them are in good faith, and working for the common good. However, when you have to work with faulty, outdated tools, even if you do your best, you cannot obtain adequate results.

History should make us friends, economics should make us partners and necessity should make us allies. Nobody should divide two peoples that nature has thus united. Our relations with English-speaking Canadians are becoming more and more essential; they are in the best interests of Canadians. If the situation is somewhat muddled, if there is some confusion in our relations with other ethnic groups, somebody must say so, but in a sensible,

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normal and scientific manner. We therefore have serious responsibilities.

As to the maintenance of our economic structures, our relations show an unusual decline. Mr. Speaker, we want to see Canadians control their economy, their political life, but we also wish to live in harmony with the other Canadians, regardless of their race, creed, colour or political allegiance.

We are told that our problem is economic, that it must be solved here in Canada through adequate policies; yet, they refuse to discuss those policies. And so, since the end of the last war, the tremendous progress achieved by the nation, by companies, has not prevented under-nourishment, poverty, insecurity and hardships among the vast majority of our people. Economic balance cannot spring from economic imbalance. It is an economic and mathematical point of view that demands economic and mathematical solutions.

Mr. Speaker, all those problems are easy to solve; they are not so colossal. It is a matter of finding the necessary means to solve the economic imbalance we now know. We did not produce that imbalance, we did not create unemployment in Canada, we did not organize the unions or give rise to dissatisfaction.

That dissatisfaction and all those new organizations which spring up overnight are the result of the inability of our governments to give the people what they are entitled to, to develop and take all possible scientific and economic means for the benefit of the people and not to subjugate them.

Financial organizations are subjugating the people who have a power of life or death over the government; it is not the government which must control people, but people who must direct the government and say what means should be taken, if it can not find them, to restore economic balance in order to provide to all a share of our natural wealth.

Mr. Speaker, our economic climate is polluted by our rotten social environment which breeds distrust, hate, dissension and discord among us. The stink of a decaying economy makes us experience the fears of inflation and deflation, financial crises, economic recessions, tightenings of the belt, debts of all kinds, useless direct and indirect taxes and especially continuous interests on swollen figures created with a stroke of the pen.

All this leads to social insecurity. As a reward for the work of past generations, the people, in general, only reap the bitter fruits of unemployment, debts, and sky-high taxes of all sorts.

Even though salaries are going up, they will never satisfy the greedy unions. There must be some order and authority; otherwise, everything will crumble, and we are going to experience here what millions of human beings who have lost their freedom are going through.

We, of the Social Credit, have been saying for 35 years, in every possible way, that the monetary system is strangling us, squeezing us dry. In fact, did Henry Ford not say once: "If the American people realized in what a crooked financial system they are living, they would not tolerate that system another day".
