man promised on March 4? Second, can the minister tell us whether or not he will permit the director to have access to cabinet minutes so that there will not be a situation in which there is the type of massive government cover-up which is presently going on?

NATIONAL SECURITY

TASCHEREAU ROYAL COMMISSION PAPERS—REVIEW RECOMMENDATIONS

Hon. Allan Lawrence (Durham-Northumberland): Madam Speaker, my question is for the Prime Minister. Because Mr. Ralph Branscombe was retained by the Privy Council Office, could the Prime Minister inform the House if Mr. Branscombe's recommendations about removing the secrecy classification from the transcripts of the Taschereau Royal Commission on Espionage have been presented to the government as yet and, if so, what are those recommendations, and what action is the government taking?

Hon. Bob Kaplan (Solicitor General): Madam Speaker, I should like to inform the House that Mr. Branscombe has not as yet completed his work. He is at a stage now where he is obtaining legal advice on privacy matters from the law officers of the Crown. Recently I asked how much more time his work will require, and I understand that he expects to complete it within two or three weeks from now.

DECLASSIFICATION OF GOVERNMENT DOCUMENTS

Hon. Allan Lawrence (Durham-Northumberland): Madam Speaker, perhaps I can get an answer from the Prime Minister with my supplementary question. At his Friday press conference the Prime Minister indicated a desire to have more specifics about certain security risks that occurred over ten years ago. Because the government is already in possession of these details, I wonder if the Prime Minister would undertake to declassify and make public the reports and documentation that the government already has relating to these individuals and events?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Madam Speaker, the hon. member is talking about "these" individuals. He did not mention any names and I do not know if he intends to.

FUNDING FOR NATIONAL HEALTH RESEARCH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Mr. Simon de Jong (Regina East): Madam Speaker, my question is directed to the Minister of National Health and Welfare. Considering that the Health Research and Development Program, NHRDP, is the only federal source of funds for applied research into health care, and includes such important areas of research as environmental and occupational causes of disease, disease prevention, and the evaluation of existing health programs, would the minister please tell the House why the 1981-82 budget for the NHRDP has been increased by a paltry 1.9 per cent, an effective decrease of 11 per cent when inflation is considered?
