

INTAKE PIPE MAY NOT BE REPAIRED THIS YEAR

THREE HUNDRED STRIKERS HAVE RETURNED TO WORK

Majority of Car Workers More Determined Than Ever to Stand Out.

MONTREAL, June 14.—With about a thousand of their striking comrades lining the street railway tracks and the Grand Trunk Railway embankment at Dominion, and urging them to remain with them, some 300 employees of the Canadian Car and Foundry Co. Ltd., returned to their desks this morning.

Despite this break in the ranks of the two thousand men affected by the strike, the majority seemed more determined than ever to have their demand for two cents an hour over the present scale paid.

A big meeting was held by the strikers this morning. While all the speakers urged the men to hold together and fight for what they claimed was a just principle, all strongly advocated pacific measures to weaken their case and that repressive measures would be adopted without hesitation.

That fear is keeping many of the men away was evidenced by communications received by the company this morning, of which one is the following, addressed to Mr. D. B. Smith, superintendent of the Dominion plant:

"I,, am willing to come in to work. I am not in the strike. I don't believe in them, but I am a marked man. If I come in I shall get my head knocked off. Shall keep away until things are more quiet."

When the 200 men came to work this morning they were received with jeers from their comrades, but the company had an adequate force to see that none of the workers were molested. Some stones were thrown, which broke windows in one of the shops, but there was no serious disorder.

Officials of the company stated that the strike would not be a difficult one to handle, as thousands of carbuilders are idle on this continent and strikers would be imported if necessary.

CHANGES VERY SMALL FOR YONGE-ST. WIDENING

Board of Control and City Council Fairly Evenly Divided on the Question.

Revised? Not likely for many a moon. "Till be as easy as heaven for cars to get that thing thru council," said Controller Ward yesterday on sizing up the situation on the scheme for expropriating the C.P.R. property at Yonge and King streets.

In fact there seems very little likelihood of the project ever getting as far as the council again. "The chances are very slim as far as the board of control is concerned," Controller Church and Ward claim that it was only by a fluke that the recommendation for expropriation got to the board presented to council at all. When the board considered the question these two controllers opposed the scheme and only consented to the plan in the report "as a matter of information," to quote Controller Ward. Controller Church, it will be remembered, got so thoroughly "rousted" because it appeared as a recommendation that he accused Acting Mayor Spence of "a breach of faith."

Hocken's Position.

At the meeting of the board of control the adoption of this clause of the report during the afternoon session, but in the evening he went over to the other side, and voted for having the whole thing referred back. At the same time he stated that he took this step because of the strong opposition of council to the scheme and that had he foreseen it he would have voted for sending the clause on for consideration. The controller does not seem to suffer from extraneous views on the matter.

It seems very likely, therefore, that at best, the board of control will be evenly divided on the question. Controllers Spence and Hocken opposing Controllers Ward and Church, who have no faith in the scheme. No recommendation can go up from the board.

Chances Small.

Taking the alternative of submitting the matter to council over the heads of the controllers, and the chances for the adoption of the scheme are even less promising than they were at last meeting of council. To authorize a by-law for expropriation would require a two-thirds majority of council. Considering the fact that the most kindly treatment would be given to the scheme by a slim majority of three in its favor at the afternoon session, it is as likely for Controller Spence's "two moons" to be given to the expropriation scheme by the afternoon.

Acting Mayor Spence still seems to be optimistic. He claims to believe that some action will be taken against expropriation in order to get time to think the matter over. Looks like dragging a man to get time to think the matter over.
