NORTH YORK LIBERALS PICK ON J. M. WALTON

Aurora Banker is Hope of Northern Men—North and West Toronto News.

NORTH TORONTO, Nov. 14.—(Special.)—At to-night's meeting of the North Toronto Board of Works strong representations were made by Messrs. Meen and Meen and Engineer Brookes relative to the widening of Avenue-road thru the Gamble property south of Eglington-avenue. At this point Avenue-road is only five feet wide and the property owners are all interested in the improvements. The whole matter was referred to a council which meets on Saturday afternoon. A lot of sewer accounts were submitted for payments and passed on to council.

The North Toronto Rowell Club, headed by Councillor Lawrence, went down to Massey Hall in a body. The Sons of England held a most enjoyable concert and dance in the Town Massey Hall to-night.

Engineer James is absent in Rochester, N.Y., where he is in attendance at the annual meeting of the Municipal Engineers of America.

The engineer has started a gang of men on the 15-inch trunk sewer. Centre-road and the work at plant No. 1 will be ready for sewerage as soon as the work is completed thru the Wilson property. The electric light is anticipated to Glenview and the wire for the camp is already in the Bedford Park district.

Councillor W. W. Reid of North Toronto, who has returned from a short trip to Boston, whether chvent to investigate personally the adaptability of the much-talked-of tubes to Toronto, has this to say about them:

"The stations without any pretence to architectural beauty are ugly and only occupy on the surface about 20 x 40 feet space.

"The interior of the station is spacious, clean and well ventilated; the tubes clean, well ventilated and nicely lighted by electricity.

"A close investigation amongst artisans completely convinced me that it was not the wealthy as much as the poor and middle class who were benefited by the subway in Boston. A blue nose from N. B. Canada, said he had lived in Boston about twenty years. He was a fireman and received \$3.00 per day. The tunnel, as he called it, saved him half an hour's time in the morning and the same at night and the extra charge was one cent each way. But he did not mind the two cents as he saved about forty cents each day, for he would sooner have had the position of driver in a street car an extra hour each day. Would tradesmen and laborers vote tubes as ugly? The question was before them? Yes, every man of them, he replied, for they save us time and money."

"Yes, the tubes are money-saving, time-saving and life-saving. They save money because they are a paying investment for any city. They save time because they give a rapid transit. They save life because they reduce congestion, where skulls are cracked, limbs broken and severed and nerves shocked," said the chairman of the Fire and Light Committee.

NEW MARKET.

NEW MARKET, Nov. 14.—(Special.)—Nearly 200 Liberals from all parts of the riding met in convention here this afternoon to select a candidate for North York in the coming provincial election. Half a dozen names were placed in nomination, but none of the gentlemen in the room were the proposition for a moment, and they looked for a while as there would be a repetition of the East York fiasco at Markham on Saturday.

Finally Jesse M. Walton of Aurora, banker and broker, was induced to offer himself as a sacrifice, and this concession on the part of the Liberals was hailed with tumultuous applause.

Following Mr. Walton's acceptance and his inaugural address, Harry H. Dewart, the ever-present, ever-ready, spoke at great length, reiterating his belief in the value of a candidate for all the ills to which the farmers are heir.

PARIS, Nov. 14.—The U. S. Consul here has been notified from Calais that it is believed that Edgar W. Mix, the well-known sportsman, committed suicide by jumping from a channel steamer which left Dover for Calais Sunday night.
