Healey Falls Power.
 J. T. Culverwell and Frank M. Field of Cobourg were in the city yesterday in connection with the lease of the Healey Falls water power acquired from the government two months ago. They expect to proceed at once to the Northumberland-Durham Power Company, with the development of 4000 horsepower there at an early date. The lease was granted at the request of twelve municipalities in the county concerned and is safeguarded according to the recommendations made by the hydro-electric commission. It is a part of the commission to build power plants, but such a semi-public corporation as the Northumberland-Durham Company will enable the people of the district to be supplied to gain power at the most advantageous rates. The lease is for a period of thirty years, and every ounce of power available must be developed. The rentals to be paid the government are 75 cents per horsepower for ten years, and \$1 for the balance of the term. The lease covers both sides of the Falls and the bed of the river with the whole of the upper rapids are also owned by the government, but the Dominion owns alternate portions of these rapids. It is hoped to acquire the power for the Dominion Government, but even at present. The offer of 35 is available to the municipalities in the county, and sides of politics in the two counties.

Justice MacMahon Will on Thursday Next be Prepared to Order Metropolitan Railway to Accept the Legal Tender of Fares at the Rate of Two Cents a Mile.

Article No. 1. This agreement shall take effect on the 15th day of August, 1906, and shall remain in force until the 15th day of August, 1907, (date changed to 1908) accepted by the union.

Article No. 2. If at the expiration of this contract either party intends to change any of the clauses of same, notice shall be given in writing to the other, and the adjustment of the wages shall be made on or before the 15th day of August, 1906, (date changed to 1908) accepted by the union.

Article No. 3. Under this agreement the wages of the men employed on the Metropolitan Railway shall be 33 cents per mile, and the minimum rate of wages shall be 33 cents an hour, (ACCEPTED BY EMPLOYERS).

Article No. 4. Whenever two or more journeymen carpenters are working together, a steward shall be selected by them, who shall be a member of the Carpenters' Union, and shall perform his duties as steward so long as he is employed by the employer, and shall report all violations of this agreement to the Carpenters' Union, (REJECTED BY MASTERS, WITH UNIONS' CONSENT).

Article No. 5. Whenever a member of the Carpenters' Union is engaged in any work, he shall be paid for his services at the rate of 33 cents an hour, and he shall be entitled to one hour's notice, in writing, to get his tools in order, or one hour's pay, (ACCEPTED BY THE EMPLOYERS).

Winnipeg, Aug. 15.—(Special.)—Hon. Fred Haultain, who is in Winnipeg today, said he wanted to see the Dominion Conservative convention held in Winnipeg.
 "It should be," said Mr. Haultain emphatically. "The west is now an important factor, not only in the industrial, agricultural and commercial life of the Dominion, but eminently so in the political life. The great questions of Canada, at least many of them, are of the west. It is questionable if the west is not more in touch with the east than the east is with the west."
 "Our representation, on the basis of population even, is most unfair. The two new provinces, Saskatchewan and Alberta, should, on the basis of population, have at least twenty representatives in the house of commons at the present time, which reduces the force of the argument of our comparative insignificance as political factors."
