## Several Important Measures Passed

Several Important Measures Passed in Committee Yesterday. Several measures intimately connect-ed with the interests of the city of To-ronto were dealt with by the Munici-pal Committee at yesterday morning's session. The bill regarding the estab-lishment of a Civic Board of Control was so amended that a two-thirds vote of the council shall mean a two-thirds vote of the aldermen present at a meeting, and not necessarily a two thirds vote of the antire council. It was further definitely decided that the board shall consist of four members, the mayor to have an extra casting vote when necessary to break a dead-lock. The Board of Control may not appoint officials not recommended by the heads of departments, but the board is to have the same power to dismiss and suspend officials as the heads of departments. The two-year term for aldermen fell through. **Yacaut Land taxation Not Affirmed.** The principle of Mr. German's bill to

The principle of Mr. German's bill to tax certain lands in municipalities as farm lands was not affirmed, but the measure, in so far as it corrected a clerical error in a former bill, was allowed to pass. Mr. German's bill to establish com-missioners in cities to manage sinking

missioners in cities to manage sinking funds was withdrawn, after Ald. Hal-lam, Speaker Balfour, City Solicitor Mackelcan of Hamilton and others had spoken strongly against it.

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
