### WORLD FAIRVIEW CAMP.

Extensive Low-Grade Deposits Which Are Now Being Worked on a Large Scale

BY THE FAIRVIEW CORPORATION

Several Years' Ore Supply Blocked Out—Sixty-Stamp Mill—Dominion Consolidated—Trying to Redeem Fairview's Reputation.

Pacific Mining Letter No. 20—Relating to Fairview, B.C.

Fairview, B.C., Oct. 9.—I have just descended from the cool weather of Camp McKinley to the manager's residence at Fairview Camp. The difference in altitude in the two places is remarkable. In the course of less than 30 miles the traveler drops down from an elevation of 4500 feet in the air to a level a little above that of Toronto, and the difference in temperature in the two points is much less striking.

From a point 75 feet below the collar of the shaft a drift has been run along the edge for 150 feet to the west, all the way in ore. The ledge is well defined on this level and throughout most of the drifts only one wall is in sight, the other not having been removed from the other. There is 10 to 15 feet of ore in this level.

From this drift a crosscut has been run 85 feet to intersect the north ledge, which has several feet wide at the point where it is tapped. From the end of this crosscut 120 feet of drifting, all in ore, has been done on the north ledge and from this drift again an upraise has been made through 110 feet of ore to the surface.

Both these veins have been opened further to the east by surface tunnels 175 feet and 70 feet in length, respectively, all in ore and giving a bank of 70 feet on each side.

Twenty Feet of Quartz. To return to the main workings, below the 100-foot level, owing to the straightening up of the main vein, before noted, the shaft is run out of ore. At the 175-foot level a crosscut was run from the main shaft to catch the ledge and it took only 22 feet of work to intersect that body.

The quartz varies from a milky white to blue in color and is of a very friable character, being at a result readily crushed down and easily crushed. It carries iron pyrites, galena and some siliceous matter, but the ore is not so rich as the ore in the State of Washington to the south, and McKinley and Greenwood to the east.

But it is not alone for its beautiful site and central position that Fairview is known. It has also been heard of widely as a mining camp, and such it is, for within a range of three or four miles of the center of the town are found a number of quartz ledges, some of which have been extensively explored with the aid of the public. Unfortunately, however, owing to untoward causes, the mining history of Fairview is generally regarded as one of failure, attributed by some who pretend to know to bad judgment and mismanagement.

The fact of the extensive outcrop of low-grade ore, which, if they are ever to be made commercially valuable, must be handled on a large scale. Hereafter, those who have attempted to develop this section have overlooked this primary feature of the camp, and have essayed operations with small developments, and have thus made it impossible to the opening up and treating of small high-grade quartz ledges.


Development Needed. At last, however, a company has come into the field with a man at its head who seems to appreciate the situation and who has a moving spirit. This gentleman, with some of his fellow-directors, recognizing that the only way to make the Fairview property pay is to bring about a consolidation of interests and to carry on operations on an extensive scale, some months ago took steps to this end. By the resultant amalgamation of properties, the funds required for a number of separate interests are dispensed with, and a saving of expenditure is attained. Moreover, instead of several companies dividing their energies among a number of properties, the combined force of all under Mr. Russell's plan is concentrated upon making one proposition a winner.

The Stenwinder is the property chosen by the Fairview Corporation as that which should take precedence over all others, and a view to making it a mine, and the other holdings of the company are meantime lying idle until such time as this one has been brought up to a satisfactory condition. Personally, I may say that I came to Fairview remembering its failure of the past, but after visiting the Stenwinder, seeing its immense extent, and recognizing its general value, and observing the smooth manner in which the whole machinery of the property is being run, I am convinced that I shall leave the camp convinced that it now has a reasonable possibility of becoming favorably known to the world.

A Free Milling. The biggest quartz shows in Fairview Camp are found in a belt of schists extending within a mile or so north of the town and running westerly for some miles through the granite formation which is general in this region. In this zone occur several parallel quartz ledges, remarkable for their width and persistence as to length. The surface outcroppings of these veins are traceable on the surface over a mile. To this belt the Stenwinder of the Fairview Camp is now confined, with the exception of a small area on the west.

On my way out to see the Stenwinder I visited the Morning Star, which is one of the properties on the belt in question lying nearest to the town. Upon it within a few hundred feet of a few hundred feet occur outcroppings of three of the huge ledges which are spoken of above as having been traced for nearly two miles across the country. Each of these leads measures from seven to twenty feet in width, and I am informed that out some shallow workings which I visited some years ago, which yielded \$33,000 in gold. This property is owned by Stephen Mackinnon and D. McEachern, several other properties adjoining the Morning Star carry the same ledges, and two miles further on, beyond the old Stenwinder mill lies the Stenwinder. I will now proceed to give the impressions I gathered of that property the course of my visit to it.
