Mr. Phippen, counsel for the License-Holders' Association, gave the following as some of his objections to the act, pointing out that he did not object specially to the restrictions on the retail trade. He objected to it in connection with the wholesale phase of the question. If the court held with him in the wholesale side it would be sufficient to save the retail trade and send the act to "kingdom come," as he expressed it. He, therefore, submitted the following:

1. The act lilegally prevents distillers, brewers, etc., from selling goods manufactured by them, and which they were licensed to sell.

2. It limits, alters and restricts the class of buildings in which distillers, brewers, etc., licensed, are permitted to carry on their business.
