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BODY BLOW FOR LES DEBATS

Further Denunciation of the Editor for His Anti-British Article of Last Sunday.

CHARACTERIZED AS ANARCHY

Article Described as Obnoxious Seed Which Must Be Weeded From Our National Field.

Montreal, June 27.—The Montreal Commercial Journal, the organ of the French-Canadian business community, follows La Presse in its denunciation of the Frenchman, who in his paper, "Les Debats," published a rascally article on the King on Sunday last.

The Montreal says: "Without doctrine, without an honest opinion in life, unscrupulous among anarchists, cunning always, cool as a cucumber, what a number have we not of such types swept among us; obnoxious seeds planted by the wind through space. Still the national Canadian field must be weeded and we must extricate them. It is very difficult to understand how it is that the French-Canadians, who are loyal, attached to their constitutional laws, secure at the hands of their honorable past, so perfectly content in their country, should allow themselves to be so grossly deceived, nobody knows when, to grow in their garden, and suffer to be encircled by these birds of passage, these men who, fishing in troubled waters and abusing the hospitality which they receive, periodically pour out their yellow, dirty prose on the most solemn and respected occasions, sometimes on religion and its ministers, sometimes on the people, the leaders whom the people have freely chosen, sometimes on the people themselves, at whom they mock after all."

There are among us anarchists in partibus, not true anarchists, but those who value and object of the latter are well known, but individuals having no pivot, who feel the anarchist spirit, who sometimes take advantage of our sometimes stupid and very often badly controlled Chauvinism to earn here a crust of white bread that they are unable to earn so easily elsewhere.
