CHINESE LOAN

The Almond-Eyed People Borrow a Trifle of \$57,000,000,

And Promise Not to Alienate Their Railways to Any Foreign Power.

Meanwhile the Rebels Are Making Great Headway,

Ritualism Denounced at an Immense Mass Meeting in Old London-A Protest From Abdul Hamid Against Britain's Policy in Hgypt.

London, Feb. 1.-The London Times, n its financial article announces that a Chinese 5 per cent railway loan of \$57,500,000 has been arranged, officially guaranteed by China, and specially secured on the Chinese northern railway. China has given Great Britain a pledge that these railways will not be alienated to any foreign power.

The Shanghai correspondent of the ALD. H. M. DOUGLASS, Chairman No. 2 Daily Mail says: Ten thousand rebels are besieging Shu-Chau, the third most important city in the province of Anhoul. If Shu-Chau falls, all the north-ern and central portions of Anhoui will be at the mercy of the rebels. An imperial general, while trying to recapture Ku-Yang, was defeated on Jan. 23, losing 2,000 men.

PROTEST AGAINST RITUALISM. The Royal Albert Hall, London, was the scene last evening of a great demonstration on the part of 10,000 Protestants, including representatives of 50 Protestant organizations connected with the Established Church in England, Scotland and Ireland. Baron Kinnaird presided, and the proceedings were marked by the utmost enthusiasm. Resolutions denouncing Romanish practices in the Established Church of England were carried, and a telegram was dispatched to the Queen, praying her to direct Lord Salisbury, the pre-

Williams as Bishop of Bangor, at the Church of St. Marylebone, John Kensit, the anti-ritualistic agitator, made a scene, protesting against the "Romanizing tendencies" of the bishop. Health for 1899-Nuisances To Be Remedied.

RE-ELECTED

The inaugural meeting of the board of health for 1899 was held last night, when Chairman Taylor was re-elected for the coming year, on motion of ex-Ald. Carrothers, seconded by Ald. Pritchard.

Mr. Ira Collins appeared before the board complaining of people emptying sewage in a small creek running near his property. His tenants threatened to leave if the matter was not reme-

died. Medical Health Officer Hutchinson said he had served notice on the peo-ple in the vicinity of Mr. Collins' property, on Piccadilly street, telling them to drain nothing into the above creek. Messrs. Carrothers, Bowman and Taylor were appointed a committee to investigate and report back to the

board.

Dr. Campbell's motion, on behalf of the committee, in regard to home studies, asking that said committee be allowed to confer with the school board on all matters of school hygiene. Carried unanimously.

Ald. Pritchard again complained of the nuisance on the market, stating

that the place was at present a dis-grace to the city. It was in a filthy condition, and should be looked after. The board, on motion of Dr. Campbell, will recommend the council to ask the government for special legislation to empower the issue of debentures for funds with which to pay for keeping the market in proper sanitary condition by rental fees. The council will be asked to instruct the city engineer to estimate how much it would cost to put the market in a proper sanitary

condition. Dr. Hutchinson reported that Mr. Dale, of Lambeth, whose herd was in an unsanitary condition, had gone out of the milk business.

The members present were: Chairman Taylor, Ald. Pritchard, Messrs. Bowman, Blackwell, Carrothers, Dr. Campbell, Mayor Wilson, Medical Health Officer Hutchinson and Secretary Bell. Adjourned.

CITY HALL NOTES

The board of education gracefully recognized the services of one of their former colleagues, when they appointed Dr. Albert O. Jeffery on the public library board. He had given ten years of efficient work as a school trustee; besides presiding over various committees, he had been chairman for two years. The fact that Dr. Jeffery, in addition to his experience as a school trustee, was for several years on the board of the Mechanics' Institute until they handed over their library to the public library, coupled with his wide course of reading, including that in connection with his various university degrees, should render him of great use to the public library. It is to be hoped that the spirit of fair play shown in the appointment of such a prominent Liberal as Dr. Jeffery will be contilled, and that the Conservative majority on the board of education will not insist on making a clean sweep of all the chairmanships, but will recognize merit and allow at least one Liberal a chairmanship of committee.

The police commissioners met today and elected Mayor Wilson chairman.
