

SOVEREIGN BANK MANAGER RESIGNS

The Retirement of Mr. Duncan Stewart Announced at Montreal.

Montreal, May 21.—Mr. Duncan M. Stewart, general manager of the Sovereign Bank of Canada, has resigned. The official announcement was made today that Mr. Stewart had placed his resignation in the hands of Aemilius Jarvis, the new president of the bank, and Mr. Stewart has made it clear to his most intimate friends that on no account will he change his decision to leave the institution that he organized and built up. In doing so, he is actuated solely by the desire to give the new administration a free hand.

Seldom has the change in the management of any bank in Canada aroused so much interest as the resignation of Mr. Duncan Stewart, mainly because there has never been a banker who has come more prominently before the public, and because he stood almost alone in the organization of the Sovereign Bank.

Mr. Stewart was successfully placed the stock of the bank through out Ontario, in Montreal, New York and later in Berlin, and from its inception stood at the helm and directed the course it should take and saw it rapidly grow till, in less than four years, it had secured over \$15,000,000 of deposits and showed assets representing a value of over \$25,000,000.

The real cause of Mr. Stewart's resignation at the present time was that Mr. Stewart's name and the word Sovereign had almost become synonymous, and he felt that if a new policy was to be introduced his name should not in any way be associated with it. Up to the present Mr. Stewart has not made any plans for the immediate future.

The directors will likely defer the announcement of Mr. Stewart's resignation to the shareholders till the annual meeting, which takes place in Toronto on Tuesday, June 12.

Mr. Jammett, the associate general manager, is assuming at once all the powers of general manager of the bank.

The annual statement of the Sovereign Bank, which will be submitted to the shareholders at the annual meeting to be held June 12, should have been issued already, but the new administration have been looking into so many matters that the report will not be ready till early in June.

NEW RUBBER COMBINE

U. S. Rubber Company To Control Output of the Continental.

Providence, R. I., May 22.—Colonel Samuel Emerson Colt, president of the United States Rubber Company, today authorized the announcement that he had completed arrangements whereby the entire crude rubber output of the Continental Rubber Company, would be controlled by the United States Rubber Company. The latter will utilize some of the Continental product in its factories, and dictate how and where disposition shall be made of the remainder.

Col. Colt stated that differences which had existed between prominent officials of the companies had been settled, and there is now a community of interest arrangement between the two corporations.

"We will have contractual arrangements," said Col. Colt, "by which we will absolutely control the output of the Continental Rubber Company. We are not ready to take over the Continental Rubber Company product. It is amalgamated with us, as the corporation is not as fully organized as it would be later."

TO EMULATE TERRY

May Irwin Will Shortly Take Unto Herself a Husband.

New York, May 22.—Broadway is interested in the announcement to-night that May Irwin, the actress, is to wed her manager, Kurt Eisefeld, at Irwin Island, the Thousand Islands, next Sunday. Miss Irwin and Mr. Eisefeld are at present in New York and will leave for the scene of the wedding Friday.

Miss Irwin, whose maiden name was Campbell and whose first husband was Mrs. Frederick W. Keller, was born at Whitby, Ontario, in 1882. She married quite young and has two grown sons, one of whom attended the Naval Academy at Annapolis. When she was eight years old she was soprano of the village choir. She first appeared with her sister Flora at Dan Shelby's Adelphi Theater, Buffalo, in 1875, the sisters singing duets. At the suggestion of Mr. Shelby the sisters adopted the name of Irwin for stage purposes. She was engaged later by Tony Pastor and afterwards appeared in Pinero's "Boys and Girls" under the management of Augustin Daly. In 1885 Miss Irwin began singing the corn songs which added materially to her popularity. She got the idea through hearing servants singing ragtime at the summer hotels. Among her successes as a star were "Sister Mary," "The Swell Mrs. Fitzwell," "Courtied Into Court," and "Mrs. Black is Back."

LIGHTHOUSE COLLAPSES.

Bordeaux, May 22.—The lighthouse on Pointe De La Coubre, at the entrance of the Garonne, which was 180 feet high, and had a light which was among the most powerful in France, was so undermined by the sea that it fell yesterday. No one was injured.

THE HIGH SCHOOL GRANTS.

Toronto, May 22.—For the first time since the year 1892 the high school grants voted by the Legislature are to be paid in full as earned. This has been made by the increased amount voted at the last session of the Legislature, namely \$128,500, as compared with about \$115,000.

WOODBINE BAR MUST CLOSE.

Toronto, May 22.—The Toronto license inspectors have ordered the bar under the grandstand at the Woodbine racetrack to be closed. GLENER EDITOR ARRESTED

Hon. Mr. Emmerson Prefers a Charge of Criminal Libel.

Frederickton, N. B., May 21.—James H. Crockett, managing director of the Fredericton Gleaner, was arrested last today on a warrant issued by Police Magistrate Marsh, at the instance of Hon. Henry R. Emmerson, ex-minister of railways and canals, charging him with defamatory libel.

The warrant was served in the police magistrate's office, and the accused was immediately admitted to bail in his own recognizance for \$400 and securities of \$200 each. The bondsmen are Harry F. McLeod and Charles A. Burchill, both of this city. The preliminary examination was fixed for Wednesday, the 29th inst.

Some weeks ago civil proceedings were instituted by Mr. Emmerson against the Gleaner Company for libel. It is said that the venue will be laid at Dorchester, and the case will be tried at the September circuit court.

The information sets forth that the defendant was responsible for the publication in the Gleaner newspaper, on March 27, last, of an article seriously reflecting on the moral character of Hon. Henry R. Emmerson, thereby injuring his reputation and exposing him to hatred, contempt and ridicule. The article in question stated that Mr. Emmerson had been elected from the St. Lawrence Hill, Montreal, in company of two women of ill-repute.

PRICES CRUMBLE ON WALL STREET

Heavy Sentiment of Liquidation and an Aggressive Bear Movement.

New York, May 22.—Another heavy sentiment of liquidation on the stock market today sent stocks tumbling from 1 to 3 points. The resumption of selling was accompanied by vigorous bearish reports of gold exports, and crop damage. The downward course of the market was aided by operations for the short account. After a slightly higher opening this morning, the market hesitated, and an outpour of stocks from unknown sources caused prices to rapidly crumble. Evident uncompleted liquidation was observed in Union Pacific, Steel, common, and Pennsylvania, but support was tendered these stocks, and the bears scurried to cover their short contracts.

Reading broke from 101 3/4 to 98 1/2. Liquidation finally exhausted itself, and Reading began to recover. New York Central was under pressure, and dropped from 112 1/2 to 110 1/2, while the whole list sagged under the ceaseless outpour of stocks.

It was reported by brokers on the exchange floor that banks had been closely scrutinizing collateral for loans, and had in some instances called loans, where the security behind them was not altogether satisfactory.

The market began to turn after the first hour, when a subsidence of selling was observed. Traders began to take the long side, declaring that an unwieldy short interest had been created, because selling had been overdone. The market rose a point on an average throughout the list on the closing of short contracts. The market was feverish and excited on the rally. Shortly before noon, the failure of E. B. Havens & Co., members of the exchange, was announced.

STOCK MARKETS.

H. O. Tschler, stockbroker, received the following by private wire from Bartlett, Frazer & Carrington today:
New York, May 22.—The stock market opened irregular this morning, and under a pressure of offerings shortly, Union Pacific and the Hill stocks were sent to lower levels. Steel, common, short interest, is said to be really a long interest.
