A Second Marriage

Talked About in Connection With the Austrian Emperor's Bereavement.

The Pope Writes a Latin Ode to the Late Empress.

"Yellow" Yarns From Peking in Regard to the Imperial Family.

The Powers' Note in Regard to Crete Presented to the Porte.

A Revision of the Dreyfus Case Assured—The Delagoa Bay Deal.

Vienna, Oct. 5.—Emperor Francis Joseph, who intended passing Tuesday (his name-day) in strict retirement at Wallsee, is back in Vienna. It is rumored in court and aristocratic circles that in spite of his 63 years the Austro-Hungarian sovereign may, a year hence, contract a second marriage with the widow of his late brother, Carl Ludwig. This would be with a view to securing direct succession to the Austrian and Hungarian crowns. The Archduchess Marie Theresa, who was born Princess of Braganza, is 25 years the emperor's junior. Issue of such a marriage would supplant in the presumptive succession the two sons of Carl Ludwig's second marriage, the Archdukes Franz Ferdinand and Otto. Their mother was a princess of the house of Bourbon.

THE POPE'S ODE ON EMPRESS ELIZABETH.

The pope will confer the golden rose of virtue this year upon the Empress Elizabeth, the emperor's eldest daughter, who is married to Prince Leopold of Bavaria.

In the Vatican gardens the pope is composing a Latin ode on the Empress Elizabeth. Giosue Carducci, the most noted poet of Italy, who for almost forty years has held the chair of Italian literature at the University of Bologna, is writing a sublime poem, addressed to the Valkyries, on "The Dying Day of the Empress-Queen."

AN AGREEMENT

Between Britain and Russia—Queer Stories From Peking.

London, Oct. 5.—The London correspondent of the Paris Journal Debats announces that Great Britain and Russia are about to sign an agreement, giving the former preponderance in the Yang Tse Valley, and the latter preponderance in Manchuria. The Peking correspondent of the London Daily Chronicle, telegraphing on Monday, says: Thirty Cossacks and thirty English marines arrived here today.

According to a dispatch from Shanghai, the Peking correspondent of the Mercury, the city asserts that the Emperor of China intended to remove the dowager empress from his path, and intrusted his plans to an adherent. The dowager empress, on learning of the plot, sternly upbraided the emperor, and invited him to drink the contents of a cup to which she pointed. He swallowed the fluid at a gulp. It is impossible, according to this correspondent, to ascertain whether the emperor is actually alive or dead.

100 DROWNED!

By the Upsetting of a Ferryboat on the Indus.

London, Oct. 5.—A special dispatch from Bombay says that a ferryboat was capsized yesterday while crossing the Indus at Mittun Kote, a town of the Punjab, on the west bank of the river, and 100 of the passengers were drowned.

GET OUT!

Collective Note of the Powers Presented to the Porte.

Constantinople, Oct. 5.—The collective note of Great Britain, France, Italy and Russia, demanding the withdrawal of the Turkish troops in the Island of Crete, was presented to the Turkish Government this morning.

CANNIBALISM

Practiced Among the Votiks of Russia—A Horrible Belief.

Odessa, Oct. 5.—At the church congress held at Kieff the question of cannibalism among the Votiks came up for consideration. The Bishop of Kasan affirmed that such was the case in his diocese, and so far no really effective means had been found to eradicate it. Its votaries are so cautious and secret in indulging in this practice that great—almost insuperable—difficulties have been encountered in trying to stamp it out. These people believe that the gods are propitiated by the killing and eating of those who are under a curse, the outward and visible signs of which are incurable diseases, great and repeated misfortunes, etc.

PROTECTION IN PORTUGAL.

The Lisbon correspondent of the London Daily Mail says: With a view of adopting a policy of extreme pro-

tection in the colonies of Portugal, the government has issued a circular, inviting the opinions of experts on the industries to be protected and upon collateral questions.

IRON COMBINE.

The Berlin correspondent of the London Daily Mail says there are rumors there of the forthcoming formation of a combine of the whole German iron trade to meet the severe American competition.

THE PEACE COMMISSIONERS.

Paris, Oct. 5.—At the meeting of the American peace commissioners yesterday Gen. Merritt detailed his personal views and those of Admiral Dewey regarding the situation in the Philippines. The Spanish peace commissioners were received by President Faure. The American commissioners were presented by Gen. Porter, who handed to President Faure a cable message from President McKinley, tendering a friendly personal greeting.

DELAGOA BAY.

London, Oct. 5.—The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "Great Britain, it is reported from Johannesburg, will take over the Delagoa customs, railways and telegraphs about the middle of this month. The Transvaal Volksraad is now discussing the law binding the Orange Free State and the Transvaal to mutual military assistance in the event of an attack from the outside. This is attributed to a fear of complications arising out of the Delagoa Bay deal."

CABLE NOTES.

Keen rivalry is being displayed between France and Germany in opening up the regions around Lake Tchad. The expedition is understood to be partly caused by the necessity of ridding the Hinterland from slave-raiding bands, and of counteracting the activity of the French by a corresponding German activity.

At the next session of the Prussian Diet the government intends to introduce a bill, authorizing the construction of a canal for large steamships between Berlin and Stettin, capital of the Province of Pomerania, on the Oder, about 80 miles northeast of Berlin.

The Berlin civil courts and the Leipzig court of appeals differ in the matter of the Princess De Chimay's photographs. The Berlin courts say that the photographs of the princess in fleshings are no more objectionable than nude or semi-nude statuary. The Leipzig court regards the photograph as not artistic. The pictures will be suppressed.

There is general complaint among British merchants of the unsatisfactory state of trade with China because of the disturbances there.

MR. FORGET GETS IT

The Indian Commissioner at Winnipeg Succeeds the Late Hon. M. G. Cameron.

Ottawa, Oct. 5.—Mr. A. E. Forget, Indian commissioner at Winnipeg, has been appointed Lieutenant-Governor of the Northwest Territories. Mr. Forget will be succeeded as Indian commissioner by Hon. David Laird, of Prince Edward Island.

COSTLY SMOKE

Warehouse and 4,500 Hogheads of Tobacco Burned—Loss Nearly \$500,000.

Clarksville, Tenn., Oct. 5.—Fire yesterday in Grange tobacco warehouse, occupied by Gill & Turnley, burned about 4,500 hogheads of tobacco. Loss on tobacco and building estimated at nearly \$500,000, with insurance about \$200,000.

The fire, spreading, burned Gracie Bros' coal store-shed, the Louisville and Nashville depot, six freight cars on the track, and several cottages.

Crown Point, Ind., Oct. 5.—Fourteen houses, comprising the greater portion of the business district of Lowell, twelve miles south of this city, were entirely destroyed by fire last night. The loss will reach \$50,000, with limited insurance.
