

Madrid, April 25 .- In the matter of Spain's naval increase, it is understood that the Government has decided upon the construction of six battleships of the Lord Nelson type, six fast cruisers and several torpedo-boat destroyers. Three of the battleships will be built at Ferrol by British firms, and the remainder of the warships in England. Furthermore, the construction of drydocks capable of caring for a vessel of 20,000 tons will be undertaken at Cadiz, Ferrol and Cartagena.
