Coliseum, Chicago, June 11.—Late again in getting under way, the Republican national convention met this morning under an agreement to stay in session until a presidential candidate has been nominated. The prospects were for an all-day and perhaps a night session. The lateness of the leaders caused much speculation among the rank and file who gathered what deals to break the nomination deadlock might be under way. By a rising vote and in a room of apoplexy the convention then adopted a resolution recording "inexpressible loss" through the death of Theodore Roosevelt.

Senator Lodge announced amid cheering that the time had come for the convention to hear nominations for the presidency. In a noisy demonstration, Governor Allen was escorted to the platform. Senator Lodge shook hands with him, and the crowd cheered, waving Wood pennants, hats and handkerchiefs.

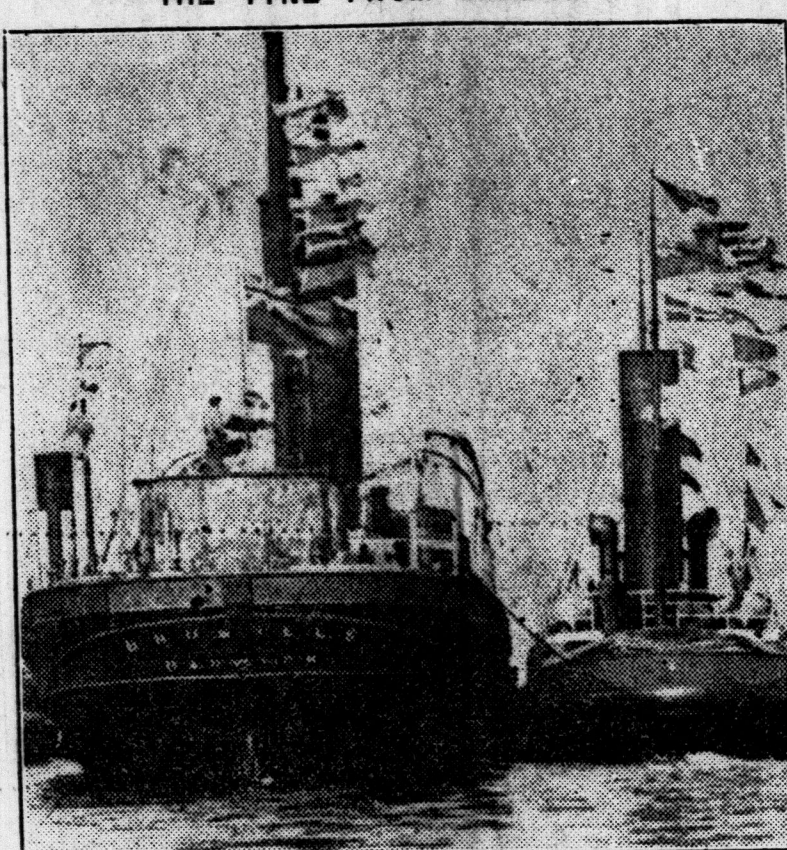

SPAIN CONFERENCE MAY BE ABANDONED AS A RESULT OF ELECTIONS

Former Italian Premier, Who Has Been Asked to Form a New Cabinet, Is Reported To Be in Favor of Resuming Full Relations with German Government.

London, June 11.—Possibility of the abandonment of the Spa conference in continuing the decision is discussed in European capitals. The success of the Independent Socialists and the Conservatives in the German elections leads to the belief in France that Germany is less than ever inclined to carry out the treaty. This belief, with the prospect that Giovanni Giolitti, former Italian premier, will form a new ministry in that country, is said to have moved Premier Millerand of France to oppose any further yielding on the question of the German indemnity, such as might be expected from the Spa meeting. It is recalled that Signor Giolitti opposed Italy's entrance into the war, and it is said his foreign policy includes resumption of full relations with Germany.

REPUBLICANS' STAND ON LABOR PROBLEMS DISPLEASES GOMPERS

Plank Adopted at the G. O. P. Convention Not Up To Expectations.

Montreal, June 11.—The labor plank adopted by the Republican Party at its convention at Chicago was condemned here today by President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor. He referred especially to the section of the plank providing for the settlement of public utility strikes by tribunals similar to the Esch-Cummings transportation board of Washington. Mr. Gompers asserted, as directly contrary to what labor had demanded, that the plank was "a record in favor of the repeal of the Norris-LaGuardia act, which would remove the right of the labor union to picket."
