EXPORT FREIGHT RATES NEW TARIFFS COMING

Ontario Millers Will Be Placed in a Better Position to Secure Trade.

C. B. Watts, secretary of the Dominion Millers' Association, together with George E. Goldie, Ayr; E. V. Tillson, Tillsonburg, and H. L. Rice, St. Mary's, members of the freight committee, returned from Montreal yesterday. They have been in consultation with the Grand Trunk Railway regarding putting into effect an export rate on flour based on the all-rail milling in transit rate from Fort William to North Bay on Manitoba wheat. It was a very difficult question to deal with, and it was found necessary to make concessions on both sides, and the members of the deputation are well pleased with the manner in which the Grand Trunk Railway, with whom the negotiations were carried on, attempted to meet their wishes so as to give the mills on that road a better chance to compete with those situated on the main line and eastern division of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Both the Grand Trunk and Cana-

dian Pacific will issue new tariffs as soon as the interstate commerce commission will allow them to do so, making the export rate via Portland, Boston and St. Louis 1-2c per 100 lbs. over the present milling in transit tariff to Montreal, and 2-2c per 100 lbs. to Halifax. This will place the Ontario millers in a better position to secure a portion of the export trade which has heretofore been largely handled by the mills on the C.P.R., which had the advantage of lower export rates.

HULL, Mass., Jan. 24.—A vessel, believed to be a three-masted schooner, was discovered ashore in Black Rock Channel, on the Lovell Sound side, and opposite Bug Light, in the lower harbor, this afternoon. The vessel was very thick and it is not known how long the vessel has been in her present position. A tug has been sent to the vessel's relief from Boston.

Passengers Walked Ashore.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—The steamer H. Starin of the Starin line, plying between New York and New Haven, went ashore at Willets Point while entering the East River this morning en route from New Haven to this city. The Starin was engaged in both passenger and freight service. She was so high and dry that the passengers walked ashore.

HAITIEN REVOLUTION.

Revolutionists Take Town of Port-de-Paix. PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti, Jan. 24.—The revolutionists have taken possession of the town of Port de Paix, thirty-five miles west of Cape Haytien. An English and a French cruiser are expected on the coast shortly. They will give protection to British and French interests. Charles Miot, the American consular agent at St. Marc, has been removed from office by the American legation, because of his complicity with the rebels. Miot is a Haytian.

Why Youth Turned Brought.

Because he had been brought from Barrie upon a criminal charge, when he was not the man really sought, and he then been turned into the street without return ticket or funds, was the excuse for a house entry and several thefts advanced by Frank Murray, a youth, in police court yesterday morning. He was turned over to the Salvation Army for care and guidance. The police explained later that the boy had been given a return ticket and had been paid for some time at the Gladstone House by the man whose mistake had brought him from his hailing point.

Accountant Ends His Life.

ST. JOHN'S, Que., Jan. 21.—Arthur Lexter, chief accountant of the Cortice Cellulose Co., committed suicide this morning. The deed is supposed to have been committed while in a fit of temporary insanity.

Rector Moved to Napanee.

BELLVILLE, Jan. 24.—The Rev. F. T. Dibb, who was recently appointed rector of St. Mark's Church, Deseronto, has been moved by Bishop Mills to Napanee.
