Yankee Olympic Records.

PHILADELPHIA, June 6.—Judging by the form shown by the candidates for the United States team at the try-outs on Franklin Field this afternoon, the best of the world's athletes who will meet in London next month to measure speed, strength and ability, will have to perform wonderful deeds if they expect to be crowned with the laurel wreath at the great Olympic games. Practically the pick of the eastern athletes are entered in the 20 events on the program to-day, and before the last event had come to an end two world's records were broken, six records made at the Olympic games at Athens, Paris and St. Louis were broken and one Olympian record was equalled. Besides this all but one of the other records were approached by inches or seconds. In the one event where in the contestants showed poor form in comparison with Olympic records, the Javelin throw, the winner was able to throw the spear only 131 feet 6 inches, held by a Swede. The world's records broken were the pole vault and the free style discuss throw. A. C. Gilbert of Yale University set the new world's figures for the pole vault at 12 feet 7½ inches. The former world's figures were 12 feet 6½ inches, and the Olympian record 11 feet 6 inches. A. K. Dearborn of the New York Athletic Club, with a throw of 139 feet 11 inches, and M. J. Sheridan of the Irish-American A.C., New York, with one of 130 feet 6½ inches, are the men who broke the world's records for free style discuss throw of 136 feet 1-2 inch. Sheridan also broke the Olympian record of 115 feet 4 inches for discuss throw. Greek style. M. W. Sheppard of the I.A.A.C. Club, clipped two seconds off the Ilympian record of 1.55 for the 800 metres race; H. L. Hillman of the N.Y.A.C. established new figures for the 400 metres, 3-foot hurdle event; J. P. Halstead of Cornell, the intercollegiate mile champion, cut the 500 metres record from 4.05 2-5 to 4.01 1-5, and J. A. Rector of the University of Virginia, who is re of Virginia, who is reported to have sprinted the 100 yards dash in 9 2-5 this sprinted the 100 yards dash in 9 2-5 this year, equalled the 100 metres (199.2 yards) record of 10 4-5 seconds in winning the first trial heat in that event D.
