THIRTEEN TORONTO MEN
NAMED AS CASUALTIES

Four Are Reported Killed, Two Have Died and Four Have Received Wounds.

Names of thirteen Toronto soldiers are mentioned in the latest casualty lists. An officer and two privates have been killed, one man formerly reported missing is now listed as killed, two have died of wounds, one is missing, two wounded and missing and four are reported wounded.

Pte. G. Griffin, 156 Erskine avenue, previously reported missing and now in the list as killed, was 21 years old and a native of Ancaster, but had lived most of his life in Toronto.

Pte. W. J. Piernie, a native of Cookstown, enlisted in Toronto about a year ago, and is reported killed.

Pte. J. E. Taylor, whose relatives are in England, enlisted in Toronto for the third contingent, and is reported killed.

Pte. A. L. Lawrence, son of Mrs. Jeanie Lawrence, 187 Degrass street, has died of wounds.

Pte. A. C. Saunders, in the lists a few days ago as dangerously ill, has died.

Lieut. John W. Lester, son of Mrs. Bella M. Lester, 321 Jarvis street, is reported to be missing since March 1. He is a graduate of Woodstock College, and had been on the advertising staff of The Evening Telegram before enlisting.

Pte. J. E. Howarth, 72 Windermere avenue, Swansea, is now listed as wounded and missing. He is a native of Bolton, England.

Pte. R. J. Wesley, whose mother lives at 7 Arton avenue, is now reported wounded and missing.

Pte. Garnet Reginald Johnson, son of Mr. Thomas Johnson, 186 Clifton street, reported wounded, was shot in the thigh. He was born in Toronto.

Pte. Leslie Gordon Bond, son of F. R. Bond, 125 Davenport road, is in the hospital with injuries to his left foot and side. He is also reported as seriously ill.

Pte. W. J. Davis, whose kin live in England, enlisted in Toronto and is listed as wounded. He went overseas in May.

Driver Alex. Dawa, whose parents live at 37 Greenwood avenue, was wounded February 13. He is injured in the ankle.

Pte. William C. Dies, son of Geo. W. Dies, 115 Kensington avenue, reported wounded recently, has lost his right hand and one eye, it has been learned.

Pte. H. L. Hughes, 332 George street, is also listed among those wounded.

JOHN MACKAY APPEALS
IN CASE AGAINST CITY

John Mackay filed notice of appeal against the judgment of Justice Middleton in disposing of his suit against the City of Toronto for \$42,000, at Osgoode Hall yesterday. Mackay sued the city for the above amount for alleged services in preparing an account for the proposed purchase of the street railway and Toronto Electric Light Company.

It is charged by the plaintiff that Justice Middleton erred in ruling that there could be no recovery without a bylaw of the city council authorizing the employment of Mackay. Also, that his lordship erred in holding that the case was not within the purview of those cases in which municipal corporations have been held liable in the absence of a bylaw under seal because the consideration has been executed and accepted.

Preparations were made at Osgoode Hall yesterday for the erection of a new vault to be installed to hold filed papers and other documents. The vault will be two stories in height.

ACQUITTED IN SESSIONS.
Wesley Prescazor Was Charged With Stealing Gas.

On a charge of stealing gas from the Consumers' Gas Co., Wesley Prescazor was acquitted yesterday when he appeared before Judge Coatsworth in the sessions. James Sherrin, gas inspector, testified that he had visited Prescazor's home on Jan. 26, where he smelled the odor of gas, and the meter had been removed from the house in August. Prescazor strenuously denied the charge, and as the evidence was deemed insufficient to convict, Prescazor was discharged. Fletcher Kerr was counsel for the defendant.

CAPT. F. M. HUTCHINSON
IS KILLED IN ACTION

Capt. Frederick Mellor Hutchinson, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. T. Hutchinson, 807 Keele street, has been killed in action, according to an official message received Tuesday. Capt. Hutchinson was born in Toronto 25 years ago and attended Lansdowne school and Harbord Collegiate Institute. Later he went to the Royal Military College where he ranked at the head of his class, graduating in 1912 and receiving the Canadian Government scholarship.

He was about to graduate from the Military Engineers' College, Chatham, England. He was about to graduate from the government to look after the defensive armaments at Halifax. Completing the fortifications there, he secured an appointment with the Engineers and reached France last July.

During his term at Chatham he was presented to the king as a result of honors received in his studies. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and leaves, besides his parents, one sister.

New Scheme of Government
For Cities Frowned Upon

The Guelph bill of Hugh Guthrie, M.P., city solicitor, was thrown out by the private bills committee yesterday. The bill proposed that the city should be governed by a council of 12 electors, and four more aldermen appointed by them. These 16 should sit for three years, a third retiring annually. The council should elect a mayor each year, and should take over all the powers of one for city commissions, for parks, waterworks, light and heat, public works and the Guelph Railway. The bill, he said, had received a majority of 300 in a plebiscite.

The bill for the incorporation of a new city was approved, but the clause regarding the inclusion of Crowland was given a six-months' hold.

Women Are Looking Forward
To Using Vote Intelligently

Future movements of those who worked for women's votes are outlined in the following resolutions passed at a meeting of the Ontario Equal Franchise League, presided over by Mrs. A. B. Ormsby:

"That this meeting recommends that the Ontario Equal Franchise Association shall now turn its energies to the work of preparation, study and training for citizenship until such time as the near future as it can make an effort to unite the women in the province into a citizenship league, independent of party, creed and past organization."

A second resolution, which was passed, provided: "That a mass meeting of women from all parts of the province be called early in April by the O.E.F.A. to discuss plans for training, study and preparation for citizenship."

WILLS PROBATED

The will of Pte. Joshua C. Johnson, who was reported missing April 24, 1915 and is presumably dead, has been filed for probate. It disposes of an estate of \$7,715. A promissory note and insurance policy bequeathed to Mrs. Sarah A. Warren, 116 Seaton street, and the residue of the property is to be divided among his sisters and brothers.

An estate of \$224 is left by John C. Davidson, who died in Toronto, Feb. 25. Personal effects are bequeathed to his niece, Charlotte Lawson and Mary Malley, a legacy of \$1 goes to each of his sons, John and Archie Davidson, and the residue will be divided among his daughters, Claudine and Edith, and his niece.

EFFECT NO SAVING.
Trustee McTaggart Thinks Dr. Hastings' Proposal Would Prove Ineffective.

That there will be no saving as promised by Dr. Hastings, M.O.H., in the transferring of medical inspection to the city is claimed by Trustee McTaggart. Reads Paper on History
Of Township of Georgina

The Women's Historical Society met yesterday afternoon for their regular meeting at 52 St. Albans street, when the principal feature of the program was a most interesting paper on Georgina Township, prepared and read by Miss Sibbald.

Consistent with the program was made of Jackson's Point, now such a well-known summer resort, which got its name from a captain who visited there in early days. The paper also told of the times of the rebellion of 1837, when an ancestor of the writer hid a valuable sword in the baby's cradle to save it from any rebel who might come in search of arms. A picture of St. George's Church was shown, it having been built on the same site as a previous church erected to the memory of their mother by three uncles of Miss Sibbald.

Miss Sibbald was in the chair and a good-sized bundle of socks were handed in to help in the Red Cross work of the society.

Mr. Lindsay, were present in uniform. Miss Maids, the Dominion secretary, gave an address, explaining the objects of the organization. Barrie Hayes, J. G. Grace, Capt. Potts and Lieut. Morden of the 252nd Battalion, spoke of the importance of the national life of Canada.
WOMEN WILL ASSIST.
Two hundred and fifty students of women's colleges of Toronto have expressed their willingness to enter employment upon fruit farms of the province as fruit pickers during the coming summer. At Queen's University, it is stated, the girls of Macdonald Hall, Guelph, making a total of about 400 available.
NEW SCHOOLS NECESSARY.
In the report of Inspector I. M. Levan just submitted to the members of the board of education, attention is drawn to Jarvis and Parkdale Collegiate Institutes. It states the ventilation is bad, the accommodation insufficient, equipment old and needs replacing and practically two new schools are the only satisfactory solution.
OFFICER'S WILL PROBATED.
Probate has been granted to the will of Major Charles A. Moss, a well-known Toronto attorney, who died of wounds in a Rouen hospital, Oct. 24, leaving an estate of \$44,339. Mrs. Elizabeth A. Moss, his widow, is made sole heir to the estate and sole executrix. Major Moss was the son of the late Chief Justice Sir Charles Moss.
WOMEN GOLFERS HELP.
Reports from the Rosedale Ladies' Golf Club show that as a result of all-day open golf matches held in June last, \$255 was sent to the Canadian prisoners of war fund, and \$100 to the Madge Nell Fraser fund, the first woman golfer to die during the war.
