Premier Wanted To Retrench, Mary Mannering Takes Proceed-But Was Opposed and Is Likely To Resign.

Tokio, July 3.—It is expected that morning. The Associated Press was at his request the members of his Emperor in the morning.

The nominal reason for Marquis Saionji's resignation is ill-health. The cabinet are all strict members of the Selyuka or Constitutionalist

party, and it was, therefore, necessary that they resign with him. The actual reason for the resignation of the premier is understood to be the position taken by Marquis Inouye, secretary of the home department, regarding the future financial policy Saionji. This includes retrenchment in the army and the navy, the postponement of public works, a de mand for a sinking fund, and the yearly repayment of loans. Marquis Inouye recently attacked the present Shop Girls in Cleveland Concern Government's policy regarding finances. This gave offence to Marquis Saionji, who decided to resign alone. He consulted with the other ministers and was by them persauded to accept the resignations of all the members of the cabinet.

Mikado May Decline. One unknown quantity in the sltuation is the position the Emperor may take. He possibly may decline to accept the resignations, but this is considered extremely unlikely. Marquis Katsura, who was formerly premier, probably will succeed Marquis Saioni, although Admiral Count Yamatota, former minister of marine, is a strong candidate for the premiership. The best opinion well informed circles, however, gives this position to Marquis Katsura, in which event Count Komura, at present the Japanese ambassader at London, is almost certain to succeed Count Hayashi, the present minister of foreign affairs. Count Hayashi probably will succeed Count Komura at London.
