The total number of indoor patients treated during the year just ended was 2,190, a decrease of 334 from the year preceding. Of these 145 remained from last year, and 2,045 were admitted during the year 1890-91.

The average daily number of patients in the wards during the year was 145. The average time of each patient in the Hospital was 26.13 days, being greater by 4.73 days than last year; and the aggregate number of days spent in the Hospital by all patients was 53,191, an increase of 3,371 from last year.
