LORD KITCHENER COMING TO CANADA

He Will Relinquish His Indian Command in August, Visit Japan and China and Then Examine Canadian Defence Forces

It is expected that Lord Kitchener will leave for England in a fortnight, where they will meet the Newfoundland minister of justice, Hon. M. Hunt, to prepare at the British foreign office the case of Canada and Newfoundland in respect to the Atlantic fisheries dispute with the United States, to be submitted to the Hague tribunal this summer.

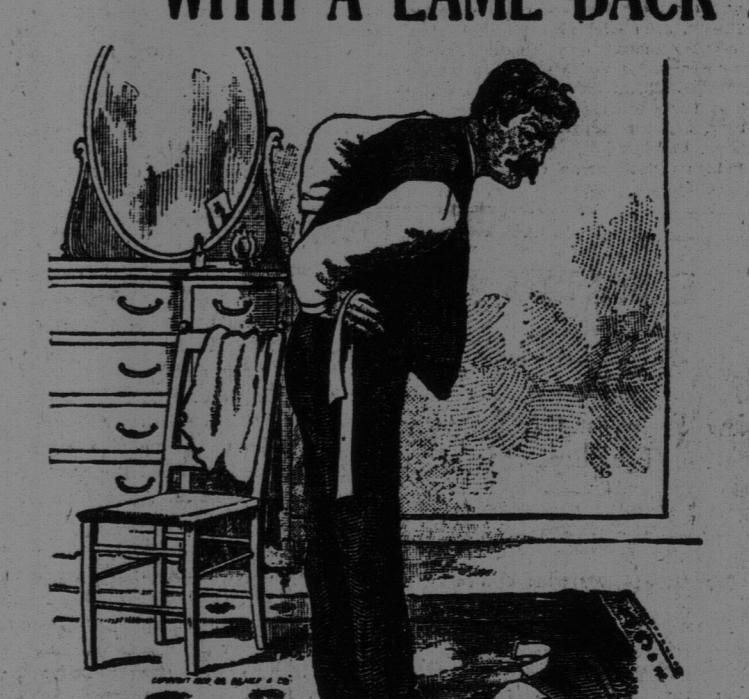

SUICIDE FOLLOWS MIXED MARRIAGE

Religious Worries Brought on Insanity of Woman in Toronto, and She Killed Herself

Toronto, April 21.—Supposedly worried over religious matters, following a mixed marriage she had contracted some four years ago, a woman named Mrs. M. J. Bell, of Toronto, committed suicide by shooting herself with a revolver in her home, 100 Clinton street, and died early this morning.

THEY OUTDID SHYLOCK. These Black Men Actually Took Their Pound of Flesh

Pittsburg, Pa., April 21.—Alleged to have outdone Shylock in having actually cut portions of flesh from the breast of a man who refused them money, Salvatore Roberto and Nicola DiGiovanni were held for court without bail at Bradford, a suburb.

With his wounds bandaged, but weak from the loss of blood, Joseph Gugliotti appeared at a Bradford bank in company with the two foreigners, and asked to draw out \$300. The teller called an interpreter and was told the story which resulted in the arrest and holding of the two men.

At a hearing before Justice of the Peace Holtzman, of Bradford, Gugliotti, repeated his story, stating that he received several black hand letters demanding money, but ignored them. He said he was aroused from a sleep to find the two men standing over him.

He said they demanded \$300 and that when he refused one of them held him while the other cut his arm and face with a stiletto. Still he said he refused to comply with their demands till one of them began carving pieces out of his breast. Then he promised to get the money and the arrest followed, when Bank Teller George Todd suspected them of being money lenders.
