## NORTHCLIFFE IN WASHINGTON


Washington, June 15 .- Lord Northcliffe, co-ordinating head of all the British war missions in this country, made an official call today on Secretary of State Lansing. He explained that he had been designated by the British war council as the head of all the special British missions with full power to direct their activities, negotiate with American officials and report to the various ministers at home. Lord Northcliffe is not a successor to
