

ALL BRITAIN'S ARMED FORCES STAND READY

Will Be Mobilized To Maintain Supplies During Strike

MAILS CARED FOR

Air Service Designated To Handle Deliveries If Called On

LONDON, May 1.—It is reported that special trains have been ordered to be in readiness at Devonport Dockyards and that men of special naval rating have been notified to be in readiness for any emergency. This is taken to mean that the trains have been ordered to transport naval men to various points in England if the Emergency Powers Act is used by the government.

All the armed forces of the Kingdom will be mobilized and if necessary the reserves called up in order to insure the maintenance of supplies to the crowded communities of Britain. Even the air force has been mobilized for the transport of mails to insure their continuance as far as possible of regular postal service.

NEWS SERVICE ARRANGED. If as anticipated, the employes of newspapers join the strike, news will be distributed by the Government through wireless stations to the public. Bodies of soldiers and sailors specially

trained to operate locomotive transport lorries, etc., are already taking their place in the machine which was organized to meet this great emergency.

CRUSHED TO DEATH

Leo Sullivan, Halifax Grain Elevator Employee, Falls Into Machinery

Canadian Press. HALIFAX, N. S., May 1.—Leo Sullivan, South End terminal, was crushed to death in the elevator machinery at an early hour this morning.

Sullivan, a member of the night shift at the elevator, was carrying out his regular duties, while the loading of a ship was in progress, when in some manner his foot slipped and he fell into the machinery.

His comrades heard his cries for help but before steps could be taken to stop the machinery, Sullivan's body had been terribly mangled and even when the machinery was stopped it was found impossible to extricate it.

Australian Urges Marked Imports

"Gems" Valued At \$2,300 Found To Be Worth \$10

NEW YORK, May 1.—When a jewelry expert valued at \$5 each a pair of supposedly antique Spanish earrings, described as being worth \$2,300, Joseph Jaffee, a jewelry peddler, was acquitted by a jury in General Sessions of a charge of receiving stolen property.

Mrs. William Astor Chandler, 141 East Nineteenth street, from whom the earrings, together with a pearl necklace and watch and chain, valued in all at \$2,600, were stolen by a window cleaner last October, testified that she had bought the gems in Paris from a Spanish woman. Mrs. Chandler's stage name was Minnie Ashley.

Jaffee contended he purchased the gems from a stranger, paying \$80 for the lot. He insisted he had no idea they were worth much more than that.

Going to his home he complained early in the evening of feeling ill and retired. He was soon in charge of a tug developing into one of the most clever towboat masters to be found in the province.

Captain Brush was 59 years of age and leaves his widow and three sons—George, William and Harry, also one daughter, all in Yarmouth; also one sister, Mrs. H. A. P. Smith, Digby, and one brother, George Brush, merchant, Yarmouth.
