## There's Hope to End Mosquito Plague

PARIS, Dec. 16.—Hope for extermination of the mosquito plague by using a type of non-stinging mosquito—guaranteed to expel the stinging variety is held out in a communication by Dr. Louis Paul Le Gendre, read at the Academy of Sciences. The scientist said that he had noticed parts of Brittany a variety of mosquitoes which never entered houses and stung human beings. Furthermore, he noted that where these were there was never any sign of the stinging variety.

As an experiment, Dr. Le Gendre imported some of the harmless variety from Brittany to the Charente department and found that the non-stingers supplanted their stinging there in a short time.

## Railway To Aid Cross-Word Fans

BALTIMORE, Dec. 16.—The Baltimore & Ohio Railroad has come to the aid of traveling cross-word puzzle enthusiasts and has installed dictionaries on all observation and club cars on all through trains on the main lines.

If the fact continues to increase as it has in the past, the company probably will place dictionaries in the cars on its branch lines.

The enthusiasm for cross-word puzzles is not confined to those who travel on observation and club cars, but it is evident in the day coaches as well. # Will Seek Repeal of Primaries Plan

On his return to this country, Col. Lynch was found guilty of high treason and sentenced to death. ## Bill for Maine Legislature May Increase Gasoline Tax

AUGUSTA, Me., Dec. 16.—One matter which will open the floodgates of oratory in the Maine legislature this winter will be a bill calling for the repeal of the present primary law and a return to the convention of making nominations for public office. Such a measure is being prepared by Senator-elect Edward S. Sanborn of Portland for introduction soon after the opening of the biennial session. It will provide for appeal from convention nominations upon petition.

It is expected that the consent over a proposed amendment to the state constitution to prohibit the appropriation of state money for the support of religious or sectarian schools will be renewed. This amendment was introduced at the last session by Senator Ralph O. Brewster of Portland, now governor-elect, but failed of passage. It figured largely in the primary campaign in which Brewster, who won the republican nomination for governor, had the support of the Ku Klux Klan.


