PARIS MAY BAR

PRIZE FIGHTING
Opponent of Bouts Asks
Why Should Duel With
Fists be Permitted.

Paris, Oct. 22.—(By Mail)—A motion
asking the Prefect of Police to bar box-
ing forever from Parisian rings has
been introduced and will come up for
discussion in the Paris Municipal Coun-
cil. Alderman Luquet is sponsor for
the measure and among his arguments
in favor of his proposed by-law is the
following:

"Why should a duel with fists be per-
mitted when duels with swords or pis-
tols are forbidden?"

Mr. Luquet kindly refrains from ad-
ding that many boxing matches held in
Paris lately have caused more damage
to the participants than the majority

MAYS NEXT YEAR

Local Boxing Fans See

Leonard - Tendler Fight
Pictures at Opera House—
Every Move of Great
Struggle Clearly Shown.

The boxing fans of this city were
treated to one of the best moving pic-
ture of any championship fight, which
has been ever shown in St. John, last
evening in the Opera House. The pic-
ture depicted the Benny Leonard-Lew-
Tendler battle for the lightweight
championship of the world, which took
place a few weeks ago at Boyle's Thirty
Acres at New Jersey, where the famous
Dempsy-Carpenter battle was fought
in 1921.

The first part of the picture showed
both men undergoing their rigorous
course of training for the big battle.
Then the vast arena with a seating
capacity of 90,000 people and the huge
crowds thronging to the scene before
the fight were clearly shown. The clos-
ing rounds of the semi-final bout be-
tween Quinn and Krug brought forth
the best of the crowd, especially on the
part of the latter.

The main bout followed and every-
one who had not been present at the
preliminary fight was shown in the
clearly on the screen as if the person
had purchased a ringside seat. The
damage to Benny's eye, which he re-
ceived from the challenger in the open-
ing round, could be seen. Tendler's
deadly left foot could be seen being shot
repeatedly in the early rounds of the
battle when the challenger was on the
aggressive throughout and a new cham-
pion looked probable. Leonard's gal-
lant rally after the seventh round was
apparent to all, and the champion could
plainly be seen as the frailer of the
two men when the bell sounded for the
twelfth and final round. Every move
of the duels, Carpentier had ten of
the spectators around the ringside

was depicted, and it showed them ris-
ing to their feet in intense excitement
when the tide of battle appeared to be
favoring strongly one way or the other.

"Almost as good as seeing the actual
fight" was the verdict of one fan as he
left the theatre last evening and this
seemed to be the general opinion. The
entire show occupied a little more than
an hour and a half and there was noth-
ing of an offensive nature shown at
any stage. This picture, however, was
followed closely every move of both
men. Exclamations could be heard in
the audience as one man or the other
landed some telling blows or ducked
clear of a dangerous swing. Taken as
a whole the picture is well worth wit-
nessing by every boxing enthusiast.
