**SEES HALIFAX AS
NEW YORK'S RIVAL**
(Liverpool Journal of Commerce)
A recent leader in The Journal of
Commerce led to some misapprehen-
sions as to the railway facilities of
Halifax are concerned. It did not take
into consideration the great possibi-
lities of the port under the new man-
agement of the Canadian National Rail-
ways. The movement to combine the
C. N. R. and the G. T. R. started on
December 1st, 1922. On the 1st of
May of this year it became an actual
fact. The all-British line across Cana-
da has gained enormously as a re-
sult of this combine. There are now
about 100,000 people employed by the
company, which runs its railway lines
for 23,000 miles over Canada. The
combine has led to great efficiency and
economy. One item alone in saving is
that of salaries to vice-presidents,
which represents an economy of 180,
000 dollars a year.

If the lines of the great companies
in Britain, Germany, France, and Italy
decide to call at Halifax instead of
New York the following set of circum-
stances will be called into play for
those travellers who want to reach
New York (for those visiting Canada
the benefits and advantages of Hal-
ifax are obvious).

Halifax will be reached one day ear-
lier than New York.
Passengers will board one of the
N. B. modern Pullman type trains—
the Maritime Express or the Ocean
Limited—to Montreal. This is a 26
hours' journey. From Montreal to
New York it is another 26 hours. But
as one day has been saved on the sea
journey this only means that the jour-
ney from Europe to New York via
Halifax is one day longer than Euro-
pe to New York direct. For the
price of one extra day the traveller
can escape all the humping and worry
of the U. S. laws concerning prohibi-
tion at sea.

When the travelling public realizes
this fact the port of Halifax is likely
to become a powerful rival to New
York.

It must be remembered that the new
programme on the Canadian National
Railways already includes big passen-
ger handling improvements in the
port of Halifax, better rolling stock,
more rolling stock, more frequent ser-
vices, and the speeding up of all trains.

This company has new head offices
in Montreal, having moved from the
old centre of Toronto. It controls the
largest grain elevators in Canada, at
Port Arthur, Ont., and has 55,000
miles of its own telegraph wires, as
well as a special express system for
merchandise and valuables. The peo-
ple of Canada now realize what the
national system means to them and to
trade in general, and they welcome it.

**FORGED EXTENSION
OF MORTGAGE**

False Document Filed in De-
fense to Action for
Foreclosure

Sheriff's Sale Ordered—Wife
Held Liable for Radiators
Purchased by Husband as
Agent—Separate as to
Property.

Montreal, June 30.—Mr. Justice
Lane, in the Superior Court, has hand-
led down judgment ordering Dame
Tilly Solomon to abandon certain city
properties to be sold by the sheriff in
satisfaction of a mortgage held by
George Cholette for a debt of \$4,300
contracted in January, 1914.

Dame Solomon opposed foreclosure
of the mortgage on the ground that
Cholette in 1918 had allowed an ex-
tension of the delay in which the debt
was to be paid, but this defence was
dismissed by Mr. Justice Lane, who
declared that the supposed extension
was false and forged, not being in the
handwriting of the plaintiff nor signed
by him.

The defendant was sued on the mort-
gage, as having acquired the immov-
ables affected from owners who origi-
nally burdened them in security for a
debt of \$4,300. In answer, defendant
produced a document which purported
to contain a prolongation of the delay
of five years, from January 20, 1914, in
which the debt was to be paid. The
document bore date of November 28,
1918, and also bore the name of the
plaintiff as signatory. It was alleged
that the plaintiff accepted this writing,
and that a duplicate had been given
into his hands. Defendant claimed that
according to the terms of the extension,
the capital of the debt became due only
on November 28, 1921. It was also al-
leged that both plaintiff and defend-
ant had put the terms of the document
into execution, and that the plaintiff
had accepted a payment of interest af-
ter the extension.

Cholette, the plaintiff, replied that
he had never granted any extension of
delay, and that the signature at the
bottom of the supposed agreement of
November, 1918, was not his signature,
being false and forged.

Mr. Justice Lane upheld the plain-
tiff's contention, declared the alleged
extension false and forged, and ordered
the abandonment of the mortgaged
properties, with interest from the date
of service of the action, and costs; in
default of making such abandonment,
the defendant is condemned to pay the
amount of the debt, with interest as
aforesaid and costs.

The radiators were ordered by the
husband, charged to him in the plain-
tiff's books, but delivered and installed
in a house which his wife was having
erected, and which belonged to her.
Mr. Justice Lane, in holding the wife
liable for the debt, declares that the
wife was acting as agent and repre-
sentative of the husband, and that she
could not liberate herself by setting up
that the plaintiff company had dealt
entirely with her husband.

Action Prescribed.
An opposition to annul a seizure of
certain lots situated in the parish of
Longue Pointe, and belonging to the
Montreal Tramways Company was up-
held by Mr. Justice Lane, on the ground
that certain assessments for the con-
struction of sidewalks levied by the
city of Montreal, for which the seizures
were made, had been prescribed.

The judgment states, however, that
the opposition was well founded only
on the ground of prescription, and only
in respect of assessments in the sum
of \$30.40, due for the year 1916.

Wolf died as a hero, but Wolf was
Wolf, and so yesterday the level lawns
of the Terhune home at Poupation
Lakes, N. J., seemed empty and the

told by his owner, Mr. Terhune, an in-

country mourned his departure. Wolf
succeeded his famous father in the

member of the Terhune dog circle. In
fact, Wolf became the property and the
pet of Mrs. Terhune.

As Mr. Terhune put it yesterday, he
became the cleverest of all the collies.
One could talk to Wolf and get under-
standing and no back talk. One could
depend on Wolf and get full loyalty.
One could let Wolf off his day and
the soft, cool nose would come poking
around and the tail would begin to wag
happily.

Wolf constituted himself warden of
the Terhune lawns and custodian of the
driveways. When motorcars parties
came in late and endangered the lives of
the puppies playing about the drive-
ways, Wolf, at the first sound of the
motor, would dash importantly into
the drive and every puppy would
scurry out of harm's way.

Every evening it was the habit of
Wolf to saunter on a long "walk."
The exercise, it seems, prepared Wolf
for sleep. Last Sunday Wolf ambled
away and—
Down in the darkness at the railroad
station some of the folks were waiting
to see the Stroudsburg express flash
by. It was a few minutes late. A
monstrous dog, with a hunted, home-
less droop on his tail, trotted onto the
track. Far down the line there came
the warning siren of the express.

saw the dog and the danger. With a
