HOUSE GETS KITCHEN AND A BANK ACCOUNT

Action brought by Mrs. I. E. Lewis, of Kemptville, Ont., against her husband, George Ernest Lewis, of North Gower, to recover the custody of her three children was settled out of court yesterday at the suggestion of Justice Latchford, of the Supreme Court of Ontario.

The terms of the settlement are that Mrs. Lewis is to get a new kitchen, \$100, which to start a bank account of her own, and \$5 for her personal use very week. She is to go back and live with her husband and both are to make an effort to live as man and wife should. Mrs. Lewis originally sued for the possession of her three children, Elsie, aged 14, Albert, aged three, and Jessie, one year old. She charged cruelty and "voluntarily" stating that she had been subjected to her associating with women of her church congregation.

On the other hand Mr. Lewis maintained that he treated his wife as a "housewife," and that the reason she left him was to go to live with her mother.

Justice Latchford wished the couple married again, expressing the hope at the time that the "amendments" to their original mode of life would bring happiness to the troubled family.

STIPENDS WERE RAISED.

Many Congregations Pay New Minimum to Pastors.

Toronto, April 1.—It has been announced by the Board of Home Missions and Social Service of the Presbyterian Church of Canada that 414 congregations had raised the salaries of ministers to comply with the new minimum recommended by the General Assembly, namely, \$1,800 a year, with a manse.

The response, it was said, had been entirely satisfactory so far, though many congregations were still to be consulted.

As the board closed the fiscal year, January 31, with a deficit of \$125,000, the board decided it would leave to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian church to say when the new minimum stipend would be made general.
