Mary Genevieve, only daughter of John Sutton, of Moncton, died yesterday morning after an illness of several months.

Anthony McNair of West Galloway, died yesterday morning. He was eighty-three years old. Mr. McNair was a well known farmer of Kent county.

Mrs. Susan Smith, wife of George Smith, of a Werville, Eumbury county, died Saturday at the age of fifty-two years. She is survived by her husband, but no children, and by her mother, Mrs. Catherine Mills and two sisters, Mrs. Edgar Carr of Geary, and Mrs. Ervin Forbes of Rusagorish; four brothers, James Mills of Montana, William of French Lake, Marshal of Fredericton, and Adolphus of French Lake.

Mrs. John Daye of Chipman, Queens county, died at the Victoria Hospital, Fredericton, Sunday evening, at the age of fifty-two years. She is survived by her husband, two daughters and six sons.

The death of Miss Annie C. Chapman occurred Sunday evening at the Moncton City Hospital. She was forty-six years of age and is survived by three brothers, Edmund of Truro, Harry of New Glasgow and Frank with the Engineers, Halifax.

Food Board Flashes For Feminine Folk

Just to remind the picnicers again—it is not necessary to have a license or permit of any kind in order to have a picnic—

But—no sandwiches between 11.30 and 2.30.

What then? Well, oysters, for instance. And any housekeeper can think of other things. As for meat—you have to watch the day you are having your picnic. You can have beef or veal on Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday evenings. And you can have pork at the mid-day meal on Monday and Saturday. That is clear enough, isn't it? For the rest you may have eggs, salad, chicken, fruit and plenty of other things. But remember—no icing on your cake.

CANNING DON'TS

Don't start canning until you have the right appliances.

Don't use old screw-tops. Buy new ones.

Don't use old rubbers. New ones are cheaper than allowing fruit to spoil.

Don't use two-quart pails. Use quart size. Pint size is best for a family of not over five members.

Don't neglect cleanliness—clean person, clean room, clean apparatus, clean work. Cleanliness counts fifty per cent.

Don't plan to can more than three to six jars of fruit or vegetables the first day. Speed up gradually.

Don't assume that the water surrounding the jars will keep boiling without attention to fuel. The right temperature must be maintained for success.

Don't mistake simmering water for boiling water. "It was boiling just a minute ago," doesn't meet the requirement of boiling water at the moment of using.

COMMON COUNCIL

After considerable discussion at yesterday afternoon's meeting of the common council it was decided that the Misses dam be repaired. The mayor gave the casting vote. Commissioners Hilyard and McLellan voted yea and Commissioners Bullock and Fisher nay.

W. E. Scully wrote, through his solicitor, in reference to the presence of N. B. Power Company rails on his property, facing Union street, West St. John. He stated the arrangement was only temporary he felt they should be moved. Referred to city solicitor.

J. H. Pullen, through his solicitor, demanded payment of his account of \$1,418.30 for painting of the Pettigill and McLeod wharves. To the city solicitor.

Tenders for the brick and buildings on the Mispic mill property were opened. E. P. Scully offered \$3,200 and A. Gregory \$2,500. These were turned over to the commissioners with instructions to report back.

Wednesday, Oct. 2, was set as the time limit for water taxes discount.

Repairs of Ashburn bridge by day's work were decided on.

Tenders for tubes for the Ludlow boilers were opened as follows: Union Foundry, 3-inch tubes, 10 feet lengths, 33 cents a foot; Phoenix Foundry, 3-inch tubes, 8x8, \$5.50 each; Estey & Co., 3-inch tubes by 10, 32 cents a foot. The tenders were referred to the commissioner of harbors with power to act, provided the expenditure did not exceed \$500.

The commissioner of public works reported that no action had as yet been taken in the matter of a public playground at Rockwood Park.

The committee of the whole reported for reduction of F. R. Taylor's assessment valuation from \$75,000 to \$5,000; against Mrs. Jennie E. Stetson's appeal on assessment, for payment of Thos. B. Carson's bill of \$804 for piling; authorizing tenders for new floors for No. 1 H. & L. and No. 7 engine houses; referring to the commissioner of finance and the city solicitor the matter of the Consumers' Coal Company use of the Reed's Point wharf. The committee also recommended that the work of driving piles at the west side ferry floats by day's work be discontinued, and that the renewal of old piles, the driving of new piles, the removal of old bickers and putting in new bickers, bolts, etc., which has been proceeded with since early last spring be completed by tender or otherwise at the discretion of the commissioner; all stock to be supplied by the city, and the cost thereof to be included in next year's estimates, if necessary.

All the recommendations were adopted.

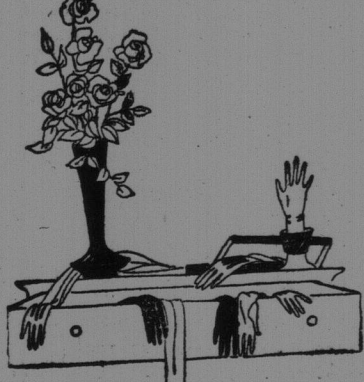
