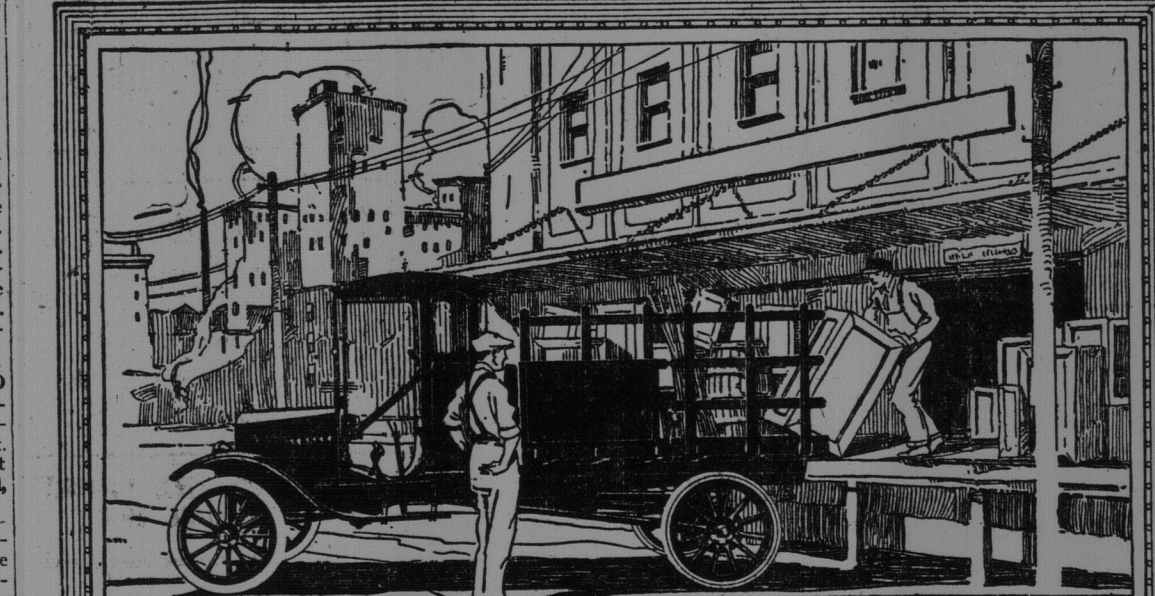
NEW BILL AT THE OPERA HOUSE

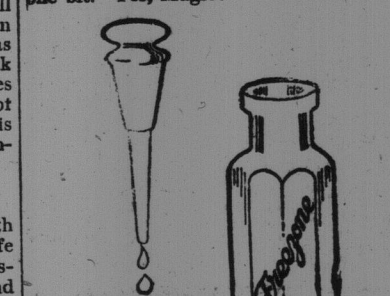

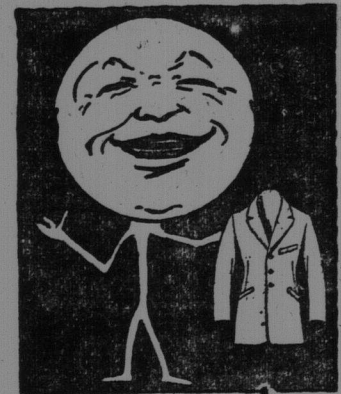

CASE OF REV. H. H. HALL

Rev. Henry H. Hall, of Wells Depot, Maine, formerly of Princeton, charged with the murder of his wife, by throwing her over a cliff last June, was held without bail yesterday for the grand jury on September 17 by Trial Justice H. H. Bourne. Medical Examiner Charles F. Traynor testified that the injuries on the body of the woman could not have been caused by a fall, and in his opinion she came to her death at the hands of somebody.
