## MONTANA MAN WED TWO THIRTY HALIFAX MAIDS AND NOW LIES IN JAIL

Joe Wolgat Alias John Simons, Arrested by Deputy Sheriff Scriven and Mitchell on a Charge of Bigamy

Halifax, Jan. 21.—Because of an over-developed propensity to marry for money, Joseph Wolgat, erstwhile a bold sailor-man in his majesty's Canadian ship Niobe, but of late an absentee from the R. N. C. V. R., lies in the county jail of Halifax on the serious charge of bigamy. Joe—no relation, by the way, to A. J. the famous lightweight—bails from Montana, U. S. A., and is a fine, big, hearty-looking chap of about twenty-seven or twenty-eight years of age.

Last November, while still serving on the Niobe, Wolgat was fined for violation of the N. S. T. A., and subsequently was before the Superior Court on a charge of having done "grossly bodily harm" to a Russian. The magistrate committed him for trial before the county court. He had secured a marriage license before leaving the Russian and while lying in the jail, he was married by Reverend Archdeacon Armitage to Miss Edith Norman, a young colored woman who was then officiating as waitress in a Water street restaurant, and possessor of a bank account of about \$200, which she had amassed by her own hard work. When the case was called in the county court the accused was accompanied by Judge Wallace.

On Saturday afternoon, the authorities became cognizant of the fact that Wolgat had again taken unto himself a wife, but without the formality of getting rid of the first one by divorce or otherwise. Bride No. 2 was a pretty young woman, Miss Mary Winifred Bishop, who through the medium of Rev. T. H. Perry, became Mrs. John Simons, the groom having changed to a suit of civies and a new name after taking French leave of the navy. The ceremony took place on Tuesday afternoon, and the bride was escorted to the altar by Deputy Sheriff Scriven and Mitchell, located and arrested the man on Saturday, but the bride's savings of \$100, already been pretty well exhausted by the nuptial fortune hunter, who had long since cleaned out the purse of wife number one. Both licenses were obtained in Halifax and were quite regular in every way, and the fact that the accused was not identified at the bureau is due to his change from naval uniform to civies. He is charged with bigamy.

## RECENT DEATHS

The death of William H. McLeod, one of the oldest and most respected citizens of the West Side, occurred at his residence yesterday. Mr. McLeod was 85 years of age. He left four sons—Thomas, John E. and Harry H. of St. John; and Robert, of Torrington (Conn.); and three daughters, Mrs. Peter Cosman, of Torrington (Conn.); Mrs. D. A. McAllister, of Boston, and Mrs. D. J. Woodrow, of West St. John. Mr. McLeod was a ship builder by trade, one of the few who remain from the old days when St. John was a centre in that industry. He was a member of the fire department, and for twenty-two years was a district fire chief. His death will be sincerely regretted by a host of friends.

At the home of Mrs. Harvey Bowser in Sackville William McKenize died on Jan. 17 at the age of eighty-one. He leaves one daughter, Mrs. Walter Wheaton of Newburyport, Mass.

Mrs. William Edward Rexton passed away in the Moncton hospital on Friday. She was formerly Miss Mina Doucet. She is survived by her husband and six small children, besides her mother, Mrs. Joseph Doucet, one sister, Mrs. William, Republic of Richibucto, and six brothers—Alexander and John of Rexton, James of Lawrence, Mass., Frank and Joseph in France, and George with the home guard at Halifax.

On last Wednesday night in the J. H. Dunn hospital, Bathurst, Mrs. Sydney DesBrisay of Petit Rocher died. She was a native of Dalhousie, a daughter of the late Sheriff Barberie, and previous to her marriage with Mr. DesBrisay had been married to Mr. Field of New York. Besides her husband, she leaves one son, A. W. Y., at present a student at King's College, Windsor, and two sons by her first marriage, Gerald Field of Seattle and Victor Field of Chicago. She also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Wallace and Miss Ella Barberie of New York.

Edward Holland of St. Martin's passed away at his home on January 19, leaving a wife, three sons and five daughters.

The death of Oliver A. Geldart occurred at his home in Moncton on Monday last at the age of seventy-three years. He is survived by his wife, one son and three daughters.

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## ROBERTSON'S Big Sale Is Still On

More Interested in Wife Than in War?

New York Times—John A. Huybers, who has spent the last two years in Albania, Macedonia and Greece as a newspaper and magazine writer and later as an official of the American Red Cross, returned recently on a French steamship, with the opinion that the war has not been an unmitigated misfortune, at least for those parts of the Balkans still under allied control.

He says: "Practically all the intelligent and educated class of Greece is solid behind Venizelos, who is working very hard to solidify the government. He has been so busy, in fact, that up to the time he left Athens to go to Paris for the November conference he had never replaced the furnishings of his home which were destroyed in the royalist riots of December, 1916. The Greeks expect to put fifteen divisions into the field next spring, and many of these troops will be equipped with Colt machine guns sent from America."

"It does not think there is any danger that the German-Austrian-Bulgarian troops can break the allied lines at Salonika; they are too strong. Of course the Teutonic alliance has the advantage of position, so that an allied advance would be extremely difficult, but the moral of General Sarrail may make a difference. When I was last in Salonika in the early fall most of the officers seemed to have lost confidence in the general. He is over sixty, and after going to Salonika married a young nurse of twenty-three. The general opinion seemed to be that he was more interested in his wife than in the prosecution of the war."

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## INVESTIGATING THEFT OF BOYZ IN HALIFAX CITY HALL

Officials Were Said to Have Been Staggering About the Building

(Halifax Chronicle.)

In the Council Chamber at the City Hall yesterday afternoon Mayor Martin opened his public investigation into the theft of the boys' winter overcoats, which were recently made by the Evening Mail that liquor had been stolen from the store room of Temperance.

The chief witness yesterday was Inspector Tracey, who verified and amplified reports published in the press as to the theft of liquor from the room in City Hall in which he had stored it for safe keeping, pending decision by the magistrate as to its disposition.

Tracey gave a detailed account of the thefts, which he said had occurred as far back as July, 1917. He told of the several occasions subsequent to the explosion on which his store room had been broken into and of his unsuccessful attempts to catch the thief or thieves.

No evidence in support of the charge against unnamed city officials was brought out yesterday. Several aldermen, when asked by the mayor to tell what they knew about the affair, were unable to give any information.

A good number of citizens were present yesterday and considerable interest was taken in the proceedings, over which Mayor Martin presided. The city solicitor conducted the examination of Mr. Tracey.

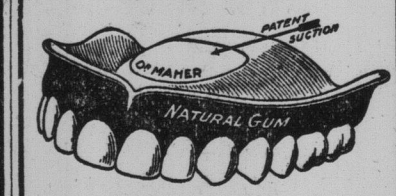

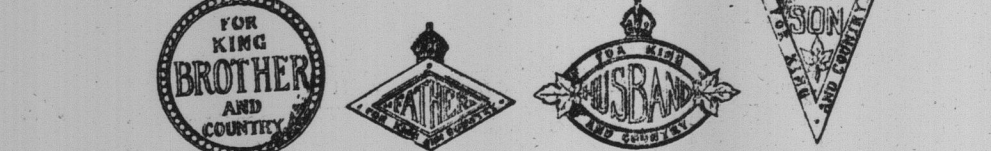
