The talk of a new hockey rink or arena is again revived with the proposition for a professional team for St. John next year. THIEVES IN CHINESE LAUNDRY
Sunday Evening Break is Made in Paradise Row
THEY STEAL \$28

Entrance Forced Between Six and Nine O'Clock, and Till is Torn From Its Place—Males Talk About Leniency Shown Criminals

At an hour last evening when there were many people passing in the streets and when there was every danger of being seen or heard, a bold robbery was committed in Paradise row, when the Chinese laundry conducted by Sing Lee was broken into and about \$28, representing the earnings of the proprietor for the week, taken from the till.

This is looked upon by many as another instance of the fact that there is a great deal of money leniency shown criminals by the courts in dealing with cases of this kind, as it is but one of a chain of robberies which have been reported in the city during the past few weeks.

The Chinese had gone out a little after 6 o'clock and when they returned about 9 they found that the store had been entered by the rear door, the cash drawer in the front part of the shop torn from its place beneath the counter, and its contents taken. The thief or thieves managed to get into the place by breaking a pane of glass in the back door slipping in an arm, and after hitting a latch on the inside, the rest was easy.

Although there were many packages of linen and clothing of different sorts belonging to citizens, in the store, these were not touched.

NOW WANT STREET CARS TO RUN OUT THE MARSH ROAD
Petition Received by County Officials—Decision on Company's Request Not Yet Reached

A meeting of the highway board of the parish of Simonds, the warden of the county and the county secretary, was held last week to consider the application of the St. John Railway Company for permission to extend their rails from Kane's corner to the cemetery and out the Bed Head road. While the matter was gone into at some length no decision was reached and another meeting will probably be held this week to further consider the project.

Some of the members of the highway board thought the railway ought to extend their tracks out the Marsh road and a petition from the residents of that district was presented asking that this be remembered, the railway asked permission to run a line out the Marsh road but there was strong opposition at that time from the horsemen who claimed that the road should be kept as a speedway, and in consequence the matter was allowed to drop.

NORTH END WHARF DISPUTE IN COURT
Third Arbitrator to be Appointed by Judge McLeod—Chancery Tomorrow

Return of the summons in the matter of the appointing of a third arbitrator in the matter of the disputed wharf property claimed by D. J. Purdy and Capt. J. E. Porter, came before Mr. Justice McLeod, W. A. Ewing, K. C., acting for Mr. Purdy, applied for a summons calling upon Mr. Porter to show cause why his honor should not appoint a third arbitrator. His honor granted the application and the appointment will probably be made next Thursday.

The February sitting of the supreme court in chancery will open tomorrow morning in the chancery court room, Mr. Justice McLeod presiding.

Outside of the common motions which may be entered there are only two cases on the docket, viz: Attorney-general vs. the St. John Lumber Company.

Loide vs. Calhoun. In this case M. G. Teed, K. C. appears for the plaintiff and F. R. Taylor for the defendant.

L. G. CROSBY WINS CASE IN NOVA SCOTIA
The full bench of the supreme court of Nova Scotia decided an interesting case on Saturday. This was an appeal brought by the Yarmouth street Railway and Yarmouth Electric Co. from the judgment of Judge Lawrence, granting an injunction, and awarding \$300 damages against those companies.

The action was brought by L. G. Crosby of St. John, who owns a mill further up the Tacket river than the Yarmouth company's dam. He alleged that the dam forced the level of the water up at his property, so that it interfered with the mill, that all wishing to make the trip leave their names with him so that arrangements may be made for excursion rates.
