

ENGINEER DEAD, FIREMAN HURT AT BAIE VERTE

Engine and Three Cars of
P. E. I. Express Run
Off Rails

VICTIM IS SCALDED
TO DEATH BY STEAM

All Passengers on Train
Escaped Injury—Cause of
Accident Unknown.

MONCTON, April 6.—Leslie Sherlock, a C. N. R. engineer, was scalded to death, and Martin Hunter, a fireman, was badly injured as the result of a run-off on the Sackville branch of the C. N. R. about 2:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The accident occurred about three-quarters of a mile west of Baie Verte, when the east-bound Prince Edward Island express was traveling at about 22 miles an hour.

Scalded to Death.
The engine and three coaches left the rails, the locomotive turning over on its side. Sherlock was scalded to death when the pipes in the cab burst. Hunter was able to crawl through the window, but the steam had badly scalded his legs and one hand. He was brought to the hospital here.

Sherlock is survived by his wife and one daughter, who reside in Moncton. Passengers on the train escaped injury. The cause of the accident had not been determined.

Was Here Friday.
Engineer Sherlock was 41 years old. He went Friday on the afternoon express to Saint John, returning in the Saturday morning. Besides his wife, he leaves one daughter, about 18 years of age. A few years ago Mr. Sherlock had a narrow escape from death when the passenger train which he was driving met an extra on the main line between Sackville and Dorchester. He jumped clear and escaped with his life.

Mining Engineer Dies in Montreal

MONTRÉAL, April 6.—John B. Hardman, a well known mining engineer of Montreal, died here last week in his 60th year. For a number of years Mr. Hardman practiced his profession in the Maritime Provinces, and was interested in gold mining there for a time. He was for some time president of the Mining Society of Nova Scotia.

WATERHILL REST 19,700 OF CITY'S DEAD

Early Days Recalled in Annual Report to Lot-holders

LOCAL CEMETERY
OPENED IN 1848

Growth of Perpetual Care—
54 Miles of Avenues
and Paths.

Nearly 20,000 people lie buried in Waterhill. That is a striking statement in the annual report of the directors to the lot holders this afternoon. Other features of interest are recorded in the 77th annual report, which was presented to the meeting by Colonel E. P. Stuart. The system of perpetual care was inaugurated in 1895. Up to this year over 4,500 private lots have been sold, in addition to the large plots referred to, and the burial to date number 19,700; there are over 14 miles of avenues and paths over 20,000 feet of drains and a water system throughout the cemetery.

As to the work of the year, it was stated that burial fees and sale of lots showed a slight decrease from the previous year, while income from interest on investments was much larger than in 1924. Ordinary expenditures were about the same, but the heavy extraordinary items being for a new truck, \$875, to replace one burnt and a shovel, dump cart, hose reel, etc., purchased at auction. Expenditure for labor was considerably in excess of the previous year, caused partly by the early season, and by work on new plots, the total amount under this head was \$12,208.

PERPETUAL CARE FUND.
This now amounts to \$160,000, invested in municipal securities held in trust by the Canada Permanent Trust Co. There are now about 7,700 lots in the cemetery, many of these are held in trust for the perpetual care. Many of these lots were regarded and seeded, and it is the intention to have as many lots as possible tip-dressed this season. Progress was made on the lots in Waterhill, and a portion of the ground opened for sale, and as these lots were offered at very moderate prices, many have been already sold. A new entrance with artistic gate had been made from Old Westmorland road, making this section easy of access from any point. For highest priced lots the directors authorized the superintendent to lay out several in Central avenue, a perpetual care station, and almost before completion every lot in the avenue was sold, while work was still going on for removal of rock and laying of drains to terrace this plot towards Dell avenue.

NEGLECTED LOTS.
Following up the resolution passed by the lot holders two years ago, the directors had done much to improve neglected lots, some 80 old unlighted iron fences had been removed, value thereof used for work on these lots; in addition some in prominent sections with no representatives had been put in order and grass would be cut at least once during the season. It was very discouraging to find owners of lots near perpetual care sections neglecting to pay for annual or perpetual care, thus detracting from the appearance of these sections under care. The naval and military plot had been enriched by the gift of five regulation headstones from the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire for graves donated under the supervision of the Imperial War Graves Commission, for which thanks was tendered. There are now 57 graves in this plot of which 56 bear the regular mark of a headstone of the Last Post Fund. They were very grateful to Mrs. Tillotson, who during the whole season kept flowers on every grave in this plot. The field of honor was decorated by the Knights of Pythias and Sons of England on certain days and the usual memorial service was held on Armistice Day.

THE MARINE LOT.
This had been graded, seeded and improved and its appearance much enhanced by two ornamental guns, the gift of the city commissioners. Another gift for this lot was a Canadian Red Ensign from the Seamen's Mission, which floats over the last resting place of seamen of all nationalities on special occasions.

The lot committee visited the grounds several times during the season, and the full board of directors held their annual inspection in July. During this month also the directors arranged for two special exhibitions days to give lot holders and others an opportunity to visit the cemetery. Judging from the large attendance and the floral decorations on graves this more was fully endorsed by the public. The usual work was well carried on during the season which was an unusually dry one, and added much to the labor of keeping the grass in good condition, while hose had frequently to be used for watering the turf. More than 600 feet of new piping was laid from Water to Hill avenue and now every part of the cemetery can be reached with hose. During the winter the men had prepared a few hundred concrete blocks for perpetual care and showing class of perpetual care. New concrete sign posts for marking the avenues had also been prepared. The directors were of opinion that, despite many difficulties, the appearance of the cemetery last summer was never better both in regard to the
